<u>Alumni in Action</u> She wanted to be a saint

As a youngster at Sacred Heart Academy going to both school Masses and weekend Mass, Lorraine Strauss Malone '76 thought she wanted to be a saint. "Then I found out you had to die first," she said. This has not stopped Lorraine from living a saint-like life. Staying true to Catholic beliefs, connecting to her religion and reaching out to others in need at countless points in her life, she has surely set an example for others to follow. To say Lorraine's life hasn't been easy is putting it mildly. Her mother Anne McConnell Strauss '54 had a stroke when she was a junior in high school. She served strenuous years in the military, moving from assignment to assignment, not able to establish roots or connections. Once married, she relocated away from family and then lost her husband at an early age, leaving her to raise three boys, each of whom have their own difficulties, ranging from physical needs to depression to functioning autism. Her own physical troubles have recently intensified, causing her to take stock of life, and her purpose. "I'm not guite sure how I have managed it all," she said. "But my faith played a role, and I credit Sacred Heart Academy for my deep connection."

Lorraine said "giving back" was instilled in her at an early age. "I loved actively showing my faith at Sacred Heart Academy, and I have continued my involvement with the Catholic faith wherever life has taken me." And life has taken her many places. In the Army, she moved from South Carolina to Kansas to Hawaii and New York. In those assignments, she found time to be a youth minister and a religious education teacher for kids on the army bases. Lorraine also picked up an Army Commendation Medal just before she was discharged in 1984. Back home, Lorraine earned a degree in secretarial science and word processing, then moved to Milwaukee in 1988. She married Pat Malone and moved to Griffith, Indiana, where she has been actively involved in the Catholic community over the years. Her most rewarding roles, she says, have been as an RCIA sponsor, bringing others into the church; and a lay director for the women's retreat when she was able to offer "witness" of her faith. When her husband passed, she again realized how important faith is, not only that you have it, but you pass it along to your children and others.

Lorraine vividly remembers building her faith at Sacred Heart Academy and says when she receives an issue of the SHA Alumni News, it's like a Christmas card from a friend you want to read and re-read. "I enjoy reading stories about other graduates and wanted to reach out to tell mine," she said.

Her fondest memories of high school include the 1975 State Basketball Championship. "I specifically remember **Bill Myler's '76** free throws," she said. "It was so exciting." She also fondly recalls sacramental events such as First Communion and Confirmation with her class. Lorraine says her favorite teacher was Karen Fredericks, who taught English, but she does have to give credit to the tough—and legendary—Sr. Euphemia. "I learned to recite regulations thanks to Sr. Euphemia," Lorraine says. "From Shakespeare to the U.S. Army, those study skills stayed with me."

If there is one thing people should know about Lorraine, she says, it is that her background—including years of Catholic education and values at Sacred Heart Academy—played a role in who she is today. As a mother, a sister, a volunteer at the church and her local library, and a citizen, Lorraine provides comfort to anyone in need and lets her faith guide her day-today.

As I write this article I find it to be a very exciting time of year for SHA. The decision to choose a child's school can be much like "back to school shopping"--- it's done in late August. But that works for us as we certainly have room in most of our classrooms for additional growth. I especially enjoy seeing our alumni come in with their eldest child who is now school age and they say things like "they want their child to have what they had, that's why they're choosing Sacred Heart Academy." While giving them a tour, alums speak about the many fond memories (and some not so fond) that occurred while they themselves were attending SHA many years prior. This year, we are blessed with an enrollment around 412 students, of which 45 are new students representing 34 new families. Last year marked the beginning of new student initiative at Sacred Heart Academy when "Student for Student" groups formed within the secondary building. Students from 7th through 12th grade joined together to form a group which participated in various activities to encourage the choice of kindness when interacting with peers. The goal for this year is further acceptance and communication among the student body, and utilization of the skills and talents of each group member to demonstrate our theme this year: "Sharing the Gift of Service". Collectively, the "Student for Student" group will work to help members of the community in a variety of ways, while also taking advantage of the opportunity to work with a diverse group of people. It is a program we hope the senior class will lead and improve with each school year.

The "Student for Student" program is just one of the many positive happenings at Sacred Heart Academy. When SHA students received their schedule request forms this past spring, they were happy to find many additional course offerings for the 2013-2014 academic year. Students could choose from new English electives related to novel studies and communications, and also a new Forensic Science elective. With the recent legislation passed by the state of Michigan which allots funding for private school students who dual-enroll, the number of SHA students taking a college class has dramatically increased. More than 30 SHA students will be enrolled in a college course this fall. For the first time, Mid Michigan Community College will be teaching a college course on the SHA campus. A MMCC instructor will have students from various grade levels in his Psychology 101 class, which will be followed by an introductory Sociology course in the winter. SHA administration is working toward increasing the opportunities available to students as the expectations of colleges and educational standards continue to evolve.

Hopefully the expanded curriculum will continue to motivate students to pursue academic excellence, which they have demonstrated through their standardized test scores. SHA students ranked highest in the surrounding area in almost every academic category on both the MEAP and MME assessments. The Class of 2013 exemplified SHA's strong academic standing with all 28 members planning to attend college. Multiple students will be furthering their education at in-state institutions like the University of Michigan (4), Michigan State University (2), and Central Michigan University (8), while others will be traveling to Alfred University in New York and the University of Chicago. One senior even earned a full academic scholarship to Mid Michigan Community College which covers all expenses for two years. Congratulations, Class of 2013! Your accomplishments are well deserved and we wish you continued success in the future.

"The Lord chose me"

Although she sent resumes to a number of schools when she was looking for a teaching role in the Great Lakes Bay Region of Michigan, **Michele Pacholka Reinke '84** says there is a reason only the Catholic schools contacted her for interviews. "The Lord chose me to teach in a Catholic school, to express my faith in daily life," Michele says. After teaching two years at St. Helen's Elementary School in Saginaw, Michele was offered a Fourth Grade position at Sacred Heart Elementary. In 2013, she celebrated 20 years of service to the Academy, her alma mater, and, she says, she will be here "another 20 years if the Lord wills it."

Michele, a graduate of Aquinas College who taught English in Japan for a year before returning to Michigan to finish her student teaching, says there were cosmetic differences continuing at SHA when she returned to teach, such as the creation of the courtyard and the new gymnasium. "But the difference this school makes in students' lives—like it did in mine—is the same. Sacred Heart is a special place," Michele says, adding that she came back to SHA just as SHAgala was gearing up for the first time, and now the number one fundraiser for the Academy will host its 20th event.

When she was in fourth grade, Michele said she remembers learning the states, state capitals, and regions of the country. "My students learn those, too," she said. Michele says her lesson plans are guided by curriculum requirements, but she especially tries to work on organization, thought processes, and study skills to best prepare students for success in their years ahead. Special times of year for her students include the Advent season, when class members prepare "Christmas Bingo" as an outreach effort to local nursing homes.

Michele's daughter, also named Michele, is currently enrolled at SHA. "I would love for my daughter to have the same experience I had," Michele said. "The friendships with classmates and Academy families, the connection to our faith, and the values education. There is a guiding hand here which makes Sacred Heart graduates successful."



On her classroom wish list for the upcoming year, Michele asked for bookshelves which will help better organize her classroom space, and updated issues of Children's **Discovery Magazine** to bring science to the classroom. "The Academy has so many needs—operational and capital," Michele says. "I am especially grateful to the Parishioners, the SHA Foundation and other donors who make great things happen for our school."

I like that we can talk about what Jesus would do. Kids attend mass with their friends. It's the ideal learning environment," Kelly says.

A third-generation SHA graduate (her Dad is **Jim Epple '59** and grandfather is **Alfonzo Epple '27**), Kelly says most important to her was enrolling her three daughters—the fourth generation—at Sacred Heart. "I wanted my daughters to have what I did," she said. "Excellent academics, good athletic experiences, and the instant 'family' which forms from smaller class sizes and the true community at SHA." But along the way, Kelly started volunteering as a parent, then coaching. Her husband's job moved them away from the area three times and back again. Kelly says when they "came home to stay", she took a part-time job teaching physical education, then helped out in the lunch room and at recess. Before long, she was even filling in as the secretary. When the Second Grade position opened in 2003—"her grade", she calls it—Kelly interviewed and got the job. Altogether, she has been at the Academy 16 years and says it is "where she belongs".

Second Grade was Kelly's favorite grade as a youngster, and, in her opinion, it's the most important grade for growth. Not only are students putting math, reading and writing into everyday practice, but they are gaining their independence and self-assuredness. "Second Grade is also an important year for sacraments, which makes it very special," she says.

Since she graduated in 1982 and went on to Northwood University, then Central Michigan University for her teaching degree, Kelly says SHA has changed in many ways. There are no longer any nuns teaching at the school, the technology has been updated, and there have been minor improvements to the facility. What Kelly is most impressed by is what hasn't changed: the importance of weekly mass, a professional dress code, high-quality education, dedicated teachers and committed families. "This is a great school. It's a great place to be, and a great place to have [my] kids. I hope anyone who has come through Sacred Heart has thanked their parents for the sacrifice of going here," she says.

For Kelly, teaching second grade at SHA is all about faith, family and keeping the tradition alive for the next generation.

"I LOVE THIS JOB"

Most often, when a former graduate calls Sacred Heart Academy for their transcript, all they have to do is say their first name. The friendly voice at the other end—High School Secretary **Shelli Lannen Sias**—can usually fill in the last name and year of graduation without them telling. Shelli, a 1978 SHA graduate, has become familiar with the families and students over the years, and seems to have incredible recall for graduation years, siblings, college choices and more. "It's a lot like being a mom with a big family—200 kids," she says. "I'm even a mom to the teachers who leave their keys or notes in my office."

Her long history with SHA helped her get the job originally. Shelli's parents, Mary Jeanne Buschle '48 and James Lannen '49 graduated from SHA, as did her six siblings and two daughters. "Catholic education was very important to my mother," Shelli said. "She was widowed in 1964 and managed to send all of us to the Academy." Shelli was married, had her children baptized, and a funeral for five-year-old daughter Julia, all at Sacred Heart Parish. She recalls walking into the Parish Administration office one day selling printing for E & S Graphics and coming out agreeing to be a Eucharistic Minister. Shelli served as Treasurer of the Athletic Association for several years, and is currently Secretary of the SHA Foundation. While her husband, Doug, was serving on the SHA School Board, he mentioned they were having trouble replacing the high school secretary position in 2004. Shelli applied for the position, gave up her sales rep job, and has been working for SHA ever since.

"I love this job," she says. "The best part is there's no typical day." Shelli says the students and teachers make her job fulfilling and she enjoys her office being a place people come for answers.

Officially, Shelli is the secretary for the 7th through 12th grade building, which is a change from when she graduated. Shelli says the physical plant hasn't changed a lot, the family atmosphere is still here, and the religious retreats—especially Senior Retreat—make memorable and rewarding experiences.

"Alumni should know Sacred Heart Academy transcends time," Shelli says. "SHA continues to graduate good thinkers with good values who become successful young people." She is most proud of her own successful daughters, **Emily Sias Wilson '03**, who earned a Doctorate in Physical Therapy and is working in St. Louis, MO; and **Elena Sias '05**, who has a degree in biosciences and is working in Portland, Oregon.

A great fit

Stephanie DeNovelles '06 interviewed at three other schools but says now, after her first year, she could not have imagined a better experience than Sacred Heart Elementary. The 2006 SHA graduate is teaching First Grade in the same classroom she attended the grade. "I tell my students that." Stephanie says. "They can relate to it. Teaching at the school where I grew up is a great fit."

Stephanie, a basketball standout who earned an athletic scholarship to

Ferris State University, says teaching wasn't really something she planned. She always liked kids, and found a real passion in coaching, but planned to go into business. At Ferris, she changed her major several times, discovering she really enjoyed elementary education. She completed a student teaching experience with Kelly Hansen at SHA and said what she most enjoys about teaching is engaging her students in classroom lessons along with life lessons.

"Academic excellence starts young," Stephanie says. "In First Grade there is a daily plan, but flexibility is the key. There is such big growth in First Grade that structure in the classroom is important during foundation math, reading and sentence lessons."

Stephanie says making the transition from student to teacher has been interesting. "I see everything from the other side now. The staff and teacher relationships--which are very strong--the supportive administrative system, the sense of community among the parents...even the SHAgala event."

Not taking her position for granted, Stephanie says she had to earn her role and, as a graduate of the Academy, feels even more strongly about the traditions at SHA. She continues to coach, and has recently added middle school volleyball to her high school girls basketball duties. Stephanie says the school hasn't changed much since she graduated in 2006. "It has the same look, the same smell," she says. As a teacher, she sees the need for more alumni and donor support, especially for upgrades in technology.

Just starting out, Stephanie can't say if she will be teaching at SHA 5 or 15 years. "What I know is that this is where I belong for now," she said. "I could not have imagined a better place for my first teaching experience. SHA is a great fit for me."

The perfect job

When **Sally Schafer Wood ('59)** called **Sharon Henry Cook** ('67) and asked her to fill a job opening in the Sacred Heart Academy kitchen, Sharon said she jumped at the chance. "I knew Sally through our sons, I loved being at school with the kids and I loved having summers off with my kids," she said. "It was the perfect job then, and it is still the perfect job for me. I am not ready to sit home yet."

Sharon has lots of fond memories from her years attending Sacred Heart. One of 11 in her family who all graduated from SHA, she recalls going to Mass every day (when ladies/ girls covered their heads for Mass); nuns/sisters teaching almost every grade; and the navy blue-checked uniforms. Sally Schafer Wood '59 was one of five siblings, children of **Eileen Hackett Schafer '37**, who graduated from Sacred Heart. She worked in the kitchen of the local hospital, then as a practical nurse at the hospital and in a local physician office. When she started putting eight of her own children through the Academy, she volunteered in the office and in her kids' classrooms. In 1984, the school asked if she would accept a paid job in the school kitchen and she has been there ever since. "We practically lived at the school, with kids in sports," Sally said. "I would get out of work, take a nap. Wait for someone at practice or go to a sporting event. With three in high school at once, there was never a free

according to Sharon, who married just out of high school and still sees some of her classmates every "now and then" around town.

Sharon, whose husband died unexpectedly in 2010, has three sons who graduated from the Academy: **Chad '89, Greg '97** and **Kevin '99.** She was a stayat-home mom when Kevin was five, but was always involved volunteering at the school. Sharon is a faith-filled woman whose religion

continues to connect her to the Academy. "It was important for me to have my sons attend SHA because I attended SHA," she said.

On the job 27 years, Sharon says she has seen lots of changes in the school, and a few in the kitchen, too. The use of computers for ordering and creating menus and the eating habits of youngsters has changed. What hasn't changed? The same menus (for Apple Crisp and coney sauce), the feeling of being "welcomed" at Sacred Heart where everyone looks out for everyone, and the exemplary manners of the students. "The Health Department inspector was there when the junior high students came through last year and he said he was 'in awe of their manners'—that made me proud," Sharon said.

Sharon said she finds rewards in her work every day, and appreciates that she and Sally are treated with respect by the students, teachers and other staff. In 2009 they were Grand Marshals at the annual Homecoming Parade. "We were so honored they wanted us," Sharon said. "That was a memorable time." night."

For Sally, the commitment to SHA, and to Catholic education, is a labor of love. "Catholic influence was a driving factor for me, and why I wanted my kids to attend SHA," she said. "They might not appreciate it immediately upon graduation, but further down the road, they realize how important these values are." Sally's eight kids are all gathered close to central Michigan, and she takes pride in their individual successes, her 22 grandchildren and 8 greatgrandchildren.

At Sacred Heart, where she

and co-worker Sharon Cook serve approximately 225 to 250 meals each school day, Sally takes pride in providing healthy, homemade food. She says the biggest change to the school since she graduated has been the introduction of computers, used even in the kitchen.

Sally gathers in June each year with six or seven of her high school girlfriends who meet in Pentwater, Michigan at the home of **Marjory (Molly) Gallagher Basile '59.** "We share stories and experiences and our lives. . . It's just plain fun to keep in touch that way," Sally says.

Speaking of sharing stories, some of the fondest memories Sally shares from her almost-30 years at Sacred Heart include the visitors who have come to the cafeteria. "Bishop Joseph Cistone ate in the school cafeteria last year, and that was the first time we've had a Bishop come through," Sally said. She also fondly recalls Fr. David Genuine stopping by with two nuns, and coffee breaks with Fr. Thomas McNamara. "The visitors we enjoy the most are parents and grandparents who come to eat with their children," Sally says. "Families are always welcome in our cafeteria."
