MAKING MEMORIES AND HISTORY

Sacred Heart Academy welcomed Alumni home, hosted many reunions, and celebrated Homecoming 2018 with a lot of firsts:

- The football homecoming game was played in an eight-man format, which the Irish won handily, beating International Academy Flint 49-0. The eight-player division has been a good move for SHA, says Head Coach **John Ruggles '89**. John and athletic director Dan Haggart agree that 8-man football not only allows us to compete with schools our size as we begin a new football tradition, but it allows SHA to showcase athletes against some of the best programs in the 8-player divisions. "Eight-player football is also an exciting brand of football, as witnessed by those who attended games this fall," says Haggart.
- Both the Homecoming King and Queen were football players: Seniors Jacob Fritz (offensive/defensive line) and Erikah Cudjoe (special teams) were elected to the top honors. This is the first time the homecoming queen has been a football player.
- Erikah Cudjoe also kicked an extra point in the homecoming game and became the first female athlete to score a point in a Sacred Heart football game.
- At the Class of 1968 reunion, Mark Simons attended via Skype from Barcelona. We are not sure if he won the award for "traveled the farthest", but he sure made an effort, making a connection at 3 a.m., a full day ahead in Spain to catch up with his classmates in Michigan.

THE IMPACT OF HANDS-ON LEARNING

As Admissions Director at Sacred Heart Academy for the past 13 years, I've had the privilege of sharing with the parents of prospective students the opportunities available at SHA which make us the best choice for their child's education. Lately, I've been highlighting the many hands-on learning experiences and service opportunities. A few that come to mind include the various STEM lab activities that all students in Kinder-prep to 12th grade get to experience. For example, the second graders recently learned about the different states of matter and explored the ideas of condensation and evaporation by changing water from a gas to a liquid and vice versa using their beakers, balloons and other lab equipment. Fifth graders had fun learning about freezing and melting temperatures by adding different substances to water such as salt, vinegar, and sugar. High school physics students built pendulum waves using strings and weights made of washers.

We also provide hands-on experiences that extend beyond the STEM subjects. The Spanish department takes regular trips to downtown businesses to facilitate an environment more conducive to conversation. Students break in to small groups, each led by a high level Spanish speaker, and enjoy a scoop of ice cream or a hot chocolate while discussing various aspects of their lives, all in Spanish! Students may enroll as early as 8th grade to begin earning high school Spanish credits. In addition, the department coordinator, April Dice, offers her room for weekly Spanish Club conversation meetings and organizes mission trips to Spanish-speaking countries. The past two years SHA students have traveled to Costa Rica to put their speaking skills to the test while serving members of the community of Alejuelita. These service learning trips are impactful for students, many of whom have graduated and continued to study the language in college.

At the elementary level, our sixth graders have made a tradition of participating in The Big Dig, an event which brings their social studies to life. Volunteer parents meet at a lot in downtown Mt. Pleasant to bury various artifacts in large garden boxes. Later in the day, the "archaeologists" take on a variety of roles as they excavate the cultures of the opposite class. The students return to their classrooms for "reconstruction" -- hypothesizing about the themes and functions of the uncovered artifacts.

SHA has had a service learning component for many years which requires students in grades 7 to 12 to earn a minimum of 100 community service hours by the time they graduate. Students earn those hours on their own time and many earn well over 200 hours. Our students also perform many service projects as a school or a class. Elementary classes walk each month to local assisted living homes or the county Medical Care Facility where they spend time interacting with the residents playing games and visiting. They also pick up trash on the school and church grounds. Other student activities include painting pumpkins for the Commission on Aging, making cards for veterans and volunteering at the Strickler Non-Profit Center and the Foster Closet. Service learning provides many benefits for our students including becoming more involved in their communities, developing better communication and leadership skills, and becoming more aware of social issues.

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Sixth graders at SHA participate in "The Big Dig", a handson experience where students are assigned archeological roles to uncover, identify, and classify items from history. The learning continues in the classroom when students hypothesize about the cultures of the people and the era they "uncovered".

SCHOOL SAFETY

School safety is very important in the world in which we live. Our students do so many things well—academics, extracurricular activities, service learning, and leadership; however, none of this would be possible without first keeping them safe.

Earlier this year, we asked for the help of current families, alumni, and friends of Sacred Heart Academy to enhance our school safety measures. A fundraising effort was led by involved parent Rick McGuirk. We had an amazing task force headed up by SHA alum and parent **Andy Theisen Jr. '02**, who became our project manager. The task force also included fellow alum and parent **Jim Goenner '87**, police officers and parents Andy Latham and Mike Morrow, and parent and technology expert Jeremy Sheets. They each provided valuable input and expertise, helping to ensure no stone was left unturned when it came to the safety of our students and that we were working with the most up-to-date options for school safety.

No fundraising at SHA takes place without the leadership of SHA Alum and Development Director, **Connie Veit McCann '81**, and we couldn't do any of this without her talents. **Jim Fabiano Sr. '61** invested and issued a fundraising challenge to our Alumni to keep the Safety & Security Initiative moving forward and we thank him for coming forward to help. His \$20,000 challenge raised more than \$30,000 from Alumni across the country. Altogether, including in-kind gifts, Sacred

Heart received nearly \$280,000 in contributions to pay for all the security improvements.

We now have a state-of-the-art "boot" system installed in every classroom, new lighting, enhanced security cameras, phones in every classroom, fencing improvements, and we will have advanced "smart" technology, door shields and room identification placards installed during Christmas break. Card access readers and final pieces of the safety plan are also in the works.

When I think about how much we were able to accomplish in a short period of time, I am humbled. We could not have done this without the very generous support of our stakeholders—alumni, parents, and friends. When we ask, you come forward to support Sacred Heart Academy, and we are extremely grateful.

One of my favorite quotes is by Margaret Mead and it says, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world; indeed, it's the only thing that ever has."

At this time of year when we stop to count our blessings, I'd like to extend my gratitude to all of you who give so generously of your time, talent, and treasure to change the world for our students. May you have a blessed Christmas season.

Our class offerings are frequently evaluated and adjusted when necessary. Starting with the Class of 2018, students are required to complete a one-semester communications class where they explore the world of public speaking by writing and delivering several types of speeches as well as researching, writing, memorizing and delivering an oration. In the modern era of social media, there is a lack of effective communication skills. This course helps our students become more comfortable with face to face communication. Financial Algebra, another newly-required course, teaches students about investing, banking, credit, income taxes, insurance and household budgeting. Family Living is another hands-on

course where students learn to cook, bake, knit, hem pants, sew on buttons, tie a neck tie, care for a baby (or egg in this case), and conflict resolution. By offering and/or requiring these types of courses, our students are set apart from their peers regardless of which career path they choose.

These are just a few examples of the many unique activities Sacred Heart students can participate in throughout their academic careers. Our small class sizes and family-like atmosphere allow us to offer experiences to help grow and nourish our students into well-rounded and compassionate citizens of the future.
