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

SAFETY AND SECURITY

Sacred Heart installs most advanced school safety system

Soon Sacred Heart Academy will have protective shields on entrances, security devices on classroom doors, and an instantaneous alert system.

The school is the first in Isabella County to partner with the Michigan-based LockOut Co. and install its SmartBoot System, aimed at enhancing school safety. "SHA is the largest single-campus Catholic school installation our company has ever done," says LockOut Co. President and Co-Founder Rob Couturier, who is Catholic and chairs the finance committee of his son's Catholic school near Lansing. "The team at Sacred Heart has a solid plan in place and we are proud to partner with them for the safety of their students, faculty, and staff."



When not engaged, the "boot" is stored inconspicuously in a container near the door(s). If ever engaged, the SmartBoot sends an automatic alarm to local law enforcement, to each room on campus, and to administrator tablets which would inform school leaders where there is a concern. In July, installers began the work of placing "boots" in doorways and planning for additional pieces of the security project. The system, to be fully implemented by fall, is part of a nearly \$300,000 Safety & Security Initiative driven by a parent and law-enforcement task force. Also as part of the initiative, Sacred Heart Academy is improving lighting for better efficiency, adding additional surveillance cameras, installing direct-dial phones in each classroom, and improving playground, drop-off lanes, and access/ entry safety.

> "Although we do not think SHA is likely for any kind of

incident or attack, today's world does not allow any school or any organization to consider itself exempt from unsolicited harm. The extra measures provided by this initiative will allow teachers to concentrate on teaching, and children to focus on learning in a safe and caring environment," says Mary Kay Yonker, Principal of Sacred Heart Academy.

"Parents can trust the wellbeing of their children every day because SHA is doing what's right for our students."

"The number of investors who contributed to this effort is evidence of the importance of the safety and security of our students," says Rick McGuirk, local businessman, Academy parent, and organizer of the fundraiser. The Initiative is 100 percent funded by contributions from parents, alumni, parishioners, and friends of the Academy. **Jim Fabiano '61** sponsored an alumni challenge to help boost donations, which to date has brought in over \$20,000. As of Alumni News press time, \$65,000 is still needed to complete each of the projects included in the overall initiative. Projects will be completed as money allows.

"SHA is a small school in a caring community in central Michigan. That doesn't mean we can let our guard down. If someone comes with bad intent, we must protect and manage against the risk. The safety and wellbeing of our students is our number one priority at all times," Mrs. Yonker says.

Interestingly enough, the LockOut Co. partnered with a Traverse City, Michigan, tech company when they first introduced the SmartBoot alert system. When representatives from the Academy met with company leaders, they were pleased to meet Joe Thiel, a nephew of **Maureen Bush Weisenburger '71**. Sacred Heart Academy is well-connected!

WELCOME, CLASS OF 2018

The Alumni Association is pleased to welcome the 33-members of the Class of 2018 who graduated May 25. This class earned over \$1.7 million in scholarship awards, had a class average GPA of 3.57, and included a National Merit Finalist, Henry Armah. This is the second year in a row SHA has had a National Merit Finalist. The Class of 2018 also completed an impressive 5,224 service hours in the community. Seniors are required to serve at least 100 hours as a graduation requirement, but in this class, 17 earned silver cords for graduation by serving 150 hours or more, and one senior, Grace Reetz, volunteered more than 400 hours on her own.

Every Day I Thank God for Sacred Heart

It's a bittersweet feeling when your fourth—and final child graduates from Sacred Heart Academy. In 1997, my husband, Dave, and I decide to enroll our oldest child, Mitchell, in kindergarten at SHA with the idea that we would give our children the same Catholic education foundation I received as a youngster: my siblings and I attended St. Henry's Catholic school in Rosebush, which offered grades 1 through 6. After that, we transferred to public school for our secondary education.

However, when the time came to make that change, neither my husband nor I, or Mitchell wanted to switch to a different school. By that time, our two younger sons, Drew and Jackson were also attending SHA and we felt like we were part of a big family. We loved the Catholic education provided by the teachers and staff at SHA, and valued the fact that all our children were on one campus and always would be throughout their high school years. We also greatly appreciated the morals and values which were being taught and reinforced from home. I remember attending an all-school Mass on occasion and sitting by one of my children. It was a vivid reminder of the investment we were making in our children's lives. Seeing the students lead the various ministries with confidence, yet reverence, and share their musical talents brought tears to my eyes many times, and still does today.

In 2005, I was offered an opportunity to work at Sacred Heart Academy in a newly created Director of Admissions position. At the time, I had been working as a systems analyst at CMU and had just completed 15 years of service. It was a long and difficult decision but once I made it and started working at SHA, I came to realize the decision should have taken about two minutes rather than two weeks. I realized God was calling me to a position where I could help make a difference for an organization which I completely believed in, and entrusted with my children. Now, 13 years later, I still feel it was one of the best decisions I've ever made. Being able to work in an environment where you can openly practice your faith, market a product you truly believe in, and have firsthand knowledge of the benefits (my four children), is truly a blessing.

When I look back on the unique opportunities that my children had while attending SHA, I think about the March for Life trips, the middle school ship trips and ski trips, and the Shakespearian Festivals. At Sacred Heart, my children could fill multiple roles. In addition to being athletes on some very successful teams, they participated in the spaghetti bridge-building team, the high school Mass choir and forensic competitions. They held officer positions in the National Honor Society, attended Close Up trips to Washington DC and Hawaii, and completed Mission trips to Costa Rica. However, none of these extracurricular activities was more important than their academics, as they developed strong study habits along the way.

These opportunities came about because of the passionate teachers who made them happen. The life-long memories and life experiences that were created helped to shape each one of my children. I like who they are--- they still volunteer, they are active and engaged members of their communities, and they treat people with respect. They are kind, hardworking, successful individuals who live balanced lives with a strong family commitment. They each have a great network of friends, many of whom they met while at SHA. They didn't just stumble upon their way of life and it didn't come solely from my husband and me. We worked as a team along with the teachers and staff of Sacred Heart Academy to help shape who they've become. In Drew's words, "the close-knit community at Sacred Heart helped provide[him] with a good set of values to live by. The small class sizes and teachers who really care built a sense of accountability that has served [him] well later in life."

A GREAT SOURCE OF PRIDE

A milestone event has occurred in my life, and it is something which has given me a tremendous source of pride. It wasn't a big birthday, a promotion, or a mid-life crisis, but something intangible. Our oldest daughter (Maggie) graduated from a Catholic school in May; not just any Catholic school, but our very own Sacred Heart Academy.

Maggie started her Catholic education in kindergarten at St. Michael's in Brunswick, a small area between Fremont and Muskegon. At the end of her first grade year we received a letter from the priest stating that the school was closing. I was devastated! My whole life I dreamed of our kids attending and graduating from a K through 12 Catholic school. After much prayer and conversation, we found a way to get our girls to St. Mary's in Big Rapids, a wonderful pre-K through 8th grade Catholic school. We hired college students to drive when we couldn't; and one of us was on the road three hours a day to keep our girls' Catholic education going.

At the end of fifth grade, Maggie had a near-death experience 17 days after getting her tonsils out which changed her life. She spent a week at the Mayo Clinic and later said to Steve and me, "I've been thinking and I've done the research. I want to go to Sacred Heart Academy in Mt. Pleasant. I want to live by my grandparents, aunts, uncles, and cousins. Oh, and I want to be there by the beginning of 7th grade when all of the other 6th grade students are moving to the high school." Clearly our 10-year-old daughter had done her research. After much prayer, our plans came together and Maggie started at SHA at the beginning of 7th grade. Our daughter Molly was in 5th grade and our youngest, Emma was in 3rd grade. It was not an economical decision and the house we built in White Cloud sat empty for over two years. We took pay cuts and struggled to find a house.

Moving back to Isabella County and sending our girls to Sacred Heart was the VERY BEST decision Steve and I have ever made for our family. The education Maggie received at Sacred Heart has prepared her very well for the future. Maggie will be attending CMU this fall, having earned the full tuition Centralis award for the next four years. This is due to the dedication of our SHA teachers and the quality of education she has received at Sacred Heart, plus the church involvement, extracurricular activities, athletics, and high expectations which have helped her become a well-rounded person who gives back to her church and community.

One of my dreams came true when Maggie walked across the stage and, and as principal, I handed her a Sacred Heart diploma. Again, it is a great source of pride for both Steve and me, and other parents like us who have invested in Catholic education for our children.

Sacred Heart Academy has been educating students for 129 years. The tradition is alive!

In mid-June I was fortunate enough to go with SHA's advanced Spanish students (including my youngest, Grace) on a mission trip to Costa Rica. This was the second time our students made this trip and it came about largely because of the motivation of a few of our seniors who coordinated it with Mrs. Dice, our Spanish teacher. Seeing first-hand the love and faith shared by our students with the children of this third-world country was beyond life changing. Senior Sophie Ruggles said, *"One of the biggest things I got out of my week in Costa Rica was a reminder of the way happiness works. These people had absolutely nothing, pretty much everything we consider a necessity in the U.S. they didn't have, yet they were so full of joy. All they needed was their loved ones and their faith in God. One of the people that we brought food to, that was homeless, said 'All I need is your prayers' which was SO powerful. This week was such a good reminder to remove my worldly worries, Jesus is true happiness." I could not have said it any better. Our students were fully engaged with the people they encountered throughout the week. To be immersed in a Spanish-speaking community gave them invaluable experience to not only show their support and love for the children and for Jesus, but it also gave them an excellent chance to practice and strengthen their Spanish speaking skills.*

Drew (2012) graduated from MSU in applied engineering and works for TE Connectivity in Winston-Salem, NC. SHA Foundation Increases Annual Gift

The SHA Foundation, an endowment fund created in 1976 with the sole purpose of supporting Sacred Heart Academy, has increased their annual giving to the Academy by \$100,000. In April, Trustees announced they would increase the amount to \$440,000 to help the school compete with starting salaries of public schools in the region. Roman banquets, attendance at state and national meetings, and other cultural events kept the students engaged while Sister herself regularly attended professional meetings. She was once asked by a local newspaper reporter what she liked most of the teaching profession, and replied, "Seeing the light in a student's eyes when they have grasped something you have taught them... seeing that you can be of service and teaching them they can be of service to others."
