## 3<sup>rd</sup> Place – Devin Humphreys, 12<sup>th</sup> Grade

I haven't always gone to a Catholic school; for that matter, I haven't always been Catholic. I received the sacraments of initiation-- Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist in the seventh grade. My path to embracing my faith is certainly not traditional, but I wouldn't have it any other way. God's plan has manifested itself in me in many different ways. Had I not transferred from a public elementary school to a Catholic elementary school, or had any of the circumstances behind that transition been different, I may not be the person I am today.

I attended a public elementary school until the fifth grade. I would have considered myself a Christian, and I did make an attempt in the third grade to read the Bible cover-to-cover. (I gave up in the middle of the Psalms.) However, none of my beliefs were grounded in the profound faith that comes in a close relationship with God, and my relationship with the Lord was, for the sake of brevity, weak. It was then that my parents decided to transfer my sister and me to a Catholic school twenty minutes away from home.

That transfer may have been made for academic reasons and in pursuit of a better education, but at the end of the day, I personally consider it the best decision our family ever made. We have gotten so much more out of attending a Catholic school than any of us ever would have expected. Daily religion classes showed me how the Scriptures I had read connect to Catholic tradition to make up the body of divine revelation, and the logician in me drew the conclusion that this added up to something in which I could put my faith. I was therefore baptized into the Catholic faith in the middle of seventh grade; Confirmation and First Communion soon followed.

The Lord God has a plan for my life. Things had to happen exactly the way that they did in order for me to reach the potential my faith life has always had, and only the Lord can cause everything to fall into place. One of my religion teachers taught me about the Greek word "Paraclete." The

word comes from the roots "para-meaning "side" and "kletos" meaning "to call"; therefore, the word "paraclete" etymologically means "to call at one's side." This word is used rather frequently in the gospel of John to describe the Holy Spirit, and I don't think a single word is more appropriate. I believe that the Paraclete, that is, the Holy Spirit, has been advocating for me my entire life, and that the sacraments, through my reception thereof, have served their purpose by drawing me closer to God. Most significantly, the Holy Spirit guided my family and me, leading us to the Sacred Heart family and the Church as a whole.
