## "We support teachers' salaries"

At its quarterly meeting on July 22, the **Sacred Heart Academy Foundation**, **Inc**, announced the organization would increase annual giving to the Academy to provide a \$2,200 pay raise to every full-time teacher, effective at the start of the 2021-22 school year.

The Sacred Heart Academy Foundation is an endowment fund created 45 years ago

with the sole purpose of supporting the Catholic school mission of Sacred Heart Academy. The Foundation raises money, invests the assets, and annually disperses earned income to the Academy. Since its

inception, the Foundation has contributed more than \$6.9 million to Sacred Heart Academy. The current principal balance is just over \$9 million.

"Specifically, we support teachers' salaries," says Foundation President **Bill Myler '76**. Mr. Myler said the Foundation was able to increase this year's gift to the school because of three important factors. "First, the founding members of the Sacred Heart Academy Foundation had leadership and vision 45 years ago," he said. "Second, the former and current trustees have continued that vision with great passion. Lastly, we have generous donors who continue to make investments which grow the endowment each year in support of our fine school."

Appreciation also goes to the Sacred Heart Academy teachers, Mr. Myler says. In a world where technology provides the primary form of communication, the value of Catholic education is even more evident. "The moral guidance, structure, and academic excellence which are hallmarks of Catholic education — and provided by Sacred Heart's dedicated teachers — are very valuable for students today," he said, adding that the dignity and respect given and received at the Academy offers students the means for ethical decision making and actions.

Sacred Heart Academy Principal Mary Kay Yonker called the gift for teacher raises "amazing". She said the positive impact the Foundation has had on Sacred Heart Academy over the years cannot be overstated. "The Sacred Heart Academy Foundation has consistently supported our teachers and helped us significantly narrow the pay gap between our parochial and the local public schools," Mrs. Yonker said. "At Sacred Heart, enrollment is up, our kind and dedicated teachers are being recognized, and students receive an educational experience which makes them life-long learners. I thank God for the SHA Foundation."

Alumni can help by supporting the annual campaign of the SHA Foundation. When you receive the mailing this fall, please give generously. Large salary gaps still exist for teachers with Master's degrees and those who have more than 10 years of experience. "We need to retain those teachers," Mrs. Yonker says.

# Sacred Heart Academy certified "green"

"It started with a casual reference one day, " said Jennie Queen-Baker, Sacred Heart Academy STEM Lab Coordinator, who is now the Green School Coordinator as well. "We said, 'Someday we want to be a Green School'. Working on the requirements during the COVID pandemic might not have been the best time, but we achieved it," she said, adding that SHA is the only school in Isabella and Gratiot Counties currently certified.

Sacred Heart Academy was notified in the Spring that the school had received Michigan Green School certification. To be certified, the school participated in or initiated activities within four categories: Materials/Recycling, Energy, Environmental Protection, and Education.

Students participated in a service learning project with a teacher from Mid Michigan College which included a trash



audit at Central Michigan University. They also set up a new recycling program at the school, complete with a student-produced video broadcast on Earth Day about how to recycle. An energy audit, an educational bulletin board at the school, and the addition of an Environmental Science Class to the electives curriculum were also part of the school's Green School application. "One of the biggest efforts was the planning and development of a pollinator garden and bat box on the school campus," said Mrs. Queen-Baker. "We applied for funding from a local United Way program and were fortunate enough to receive it, allowing us to prepare the ground/ garden area, purchase the native plants, and install the bat box." Sacred Heart is now registered as an official Monarch Waystation.

To retain the Green School certification, Sacred Heart Academy must complete 10 activities across the four major categories each year. Mrs. Queen-Baker says in addition to maintaining the butterfly garden and continuing the recycling program, introducing hands-on Ecology lab experiences, inviting guest speakers from various fields, and involving elementary classes to help "adopt an endangered species" are planned.

From the yearly traditions of 2<sup>nd</sup> graders memorizing and reciting the first and second readings, 3rd graders dressing as a favorite saint and sharing an interesting fact about that saint on All Saints Day, to Graduation Mass and the senior girls placing a rose in front of the Blessed Virgin, plus each week seeing our students share their musical talents to enhance our worship services, our all-school Mass is special indeed.
- The annual student retreats at Spring Hill, Cran-Hill Ranch, • and Eagle Village, along with the Mission trips to Costa Rica are meaningful, each in their own way. I have memories I will never forget, and I know the students do as well.

Over the 16 years I have been at SHA I can think of two significant changes: First, we have a much more diverse student population than when I started. As Mt. Pleasant in general has become more culturally diverse, so, too, has SHA. The added

## Small but mighty! Girls track brings home a banner

The Sacred Heart girls track and field team claimed their first MHSAA Finals championship in Hudsonville, Michigan June 4.

Sacred Heart finished the day with 51 points, beating out Hillsdale Academy by 6. First-year Coach Adam Grifka was holding back tears after he realized what the team accomplished. He said it was an uphill climb all season, but they "got it done" at the right time.

"At the beginning of the season, we had a really low turnout. I didn't think it was possible for us to win," Grifka said. "All the girls did so good at finals. The biggest thing I told them was to show up and compete no matter what."

They did that, and more! Junior Nicole Olivieri came out on top in the 400 meters with a time of 57.47, a new personal record. And then the Irish just kept chipping away, claiming points in eight events total. Olivieri was the catalyst for her team in the sprints. Not only did she earn an individual title, but she ran the anchor leg in the 800 and 1,600 relays. Sacred Heart won both events with times of 1:49.04 and 4:10.74, respectively, both setting school records.
