"Swing for the Fences" needs your help

Former Irish ace lefthander **John "Zip" Epple '65** visited us in Florida just before Thanksgiving and we reminisced about baseball games and practices at Island Park, "back in the day". In 1965 we practiced in the open fields at Pullen School and played our games at Mt Pleasant High School.

When I began my coaching tenure in 1984, we played and practiced on one of the three fields at MPHS and were treated very well by the public school officials. However, there were always scheduling issues with five teams trying to use the fields. Of course MPHS would practice after school and we'd come over when they were finished. But when either school had games scheduled the practice options were limited, at times no fields were available.

In 1985, I went on a mission to find a home field for Sacred Heart reviewing several properties. Of course I ended up presenting a proposal to the Knights of Columbus for use of part of their property on South Lincoln Road. The K of C donated more than half of their acreage to SHA and, in the fall of 1985, Steve Jackson brought



his bull dozers in to shape a baseball field out of the ground there.

After a year and a half of team work , 11 feet of earth was moved off the area which is now home plate and shaped into a berm for spectators. A crew of volunteers cut and moved sod from Pleasant Hills Golf Course to make an infield. The phone company donated poles for right field, and local oil companies gave us pipe which was welded into fence rails by Bigard Drilling and Oil Patch Machinery. I

don't remember who arranged for rolls and rolls of used fencing from Dow Chemical to surround the ball park. Some of that fencing is still standing today!

The field was not quite ready in April of 1987 but the day before our season started, I checked the MPHS conditions and decided what we had was just as good, and our "future site" became "home".

It's been a long time developing, but is now one of the best fields available. Since the softball diamond opened in 2005, the site has been the spring home for hundreds of Irish athletes. The concession stand/restrooms, opened in 2011, significantly enhanced the spectator experience, but the danger of foul balls reaching the crowd and potentially causing injury remains.

Our current *Swing for the Fences* campaign was conceived to replace the chain link that was installed over 30 years ago (and was maybe 30 years old at that time!) and to expand the fencing to create better protection for spectators. The campaign has raised \$23,000 to date and our goal is \$65,000. Flyers were mailed to many former players and friends, but all are welcome to contribute to this important project. SHA is special

During this 130th anniversary year, I took a few moments to look through our historical yearbooks (which are all available online at <u>https://academy.sha.net/alumni/sha-</u> <u>yearbooks.cfm</u>) and found not only how things have changed, but also how things have remained the same throughout the 130 years. I found lots of "gems"... descriptions of teachers, narrative on sports and activities, and always, always, the "SHA is special" message.

Starting with our earliest yearbook of record, the 1916 "Echos from the Mount" I found a Class Will, which read (in part) as follows:

For the past four years our unceasing efforts have been spent to gain the required knowledge by which we could reach the goal now attained.

We have struggled on undaunted by great obstructions, such a Geometry prepositions and questions in Theology, suggested to the teachers by Perry's Instructions. We have conquered the much- dreaded Chemistry and have escaped the deadly gases of the laboratory unharmed.

Today we stand conquerors and wish to leave something which will help our successors over their rough journey.

Some things are ours and can be taken away from us by no earthly power, the others we leave to succeeding classes of the Academy.

So be it remembered that we, the class of 1916 of the City of Mt. Pleasant, County of Isabella, State of Michigan, being of sound mind and memory, but realizing that we are soon to depart from your midst, do hereby make, execute and declare this to be our last will and testament, that is to say: after the payment of our just debts and graduating expenses, we give, devise and bequeath all our high school properties and privileges as follows;

- First to our Alma Mater we bequeath a set of books for the library, hoping that they will help the remaining classes in the cultivation of choice literature.
- Second We do freely give to the Juniors the Physical laboratory with the injunction, "Thou shalt be quiet, when in said laboratory or suffer banishment."
- Third To the Sophomores we freely give all our prized Senior conceit.
- Fourth To the Freshmen we leave our manuscripts on Newman's "Dream of Gerontius" to give them some new methods of book making. Senior classes no longer leave a Class Will, but I'm

thinking if they did, it could have some very similar bequeaths, especially the Senior conceit. While we no longer call it by the same name, many times I hear teachers and parents say something along the lines of "senioritis" has set in or is setting in, meaning our seniors no longer seem to be as invested in their education as they were up until that point (onset is usually start of their last semester in high school). The Will would like-ly still include reference to bequeathing a play, but instead of "Dream of Gerontius" it might be something by Shakespeare such as "Midsummer Night's Dream" or "Julius Caesar." There would also likely be some type of reference to our state-of-the -art STEM lab where all students in grades KP – 12th experience hands-on learning while conducting their own lab research. Gone are the days of standing around a teacher's desk watching the experiment and being subjected to "deadly gases."

It brought a smile to my face to read the following passage in the 1948 Cor Jesu (yearbook):

"The coronation of the queen climaxed the evening of the Homecoming Dance that was held in the School. The merrymakers formed themselves into two lines, through the center of which, the queen with her court walked to her throne. A crown of tiny red and white mums was placed on her head. Then "Doc" Sweeney, who had the honor of crowning the queen, presented her with a beautiful bouquet of white and yellow chrysanthemums. After the grand march, the party ended with prayers led by the queen and everyone singing "Mother Beloved" --- the ideal way of ending a party."

We still carry on the tradition of crowning our homecoming queen, however, it's done at our Friday assembly in front of the entire school body and most often by the prior year's queen. The dance is held the following evening at our parish center and typically ends when the DJ stops playing music around 10:30 p.m. There's no closing prayer, however, that may be a tradition we may want to bring back.

In the 1955 yearbook I found:

"Friendship, humanity, scholarship, devotion to the school and its students, an inquiring mind, a ceaseless humility and the softening graces of kindly humor combine to characterize a personality which Sacred Heart students' esteem, respect and revere."

While our terminology may have changed a bit, there is still a strong connection between SHA and its students' social and academic endeavors. With a solid academic core curriculum blended with spiritual and character development, we graduate individuals who go on and make a difference in this world, and most often with a fondness and continued loyalty to the Academy.

We recently witnessed the success and felt the support from many of our alumni when they hosted SHA seniors for Job Shadow Day and came to campus to conduct mock interviews with our seniors. This is but one example of the ongoing generous support we receive from our SHA alumni.

A quote from the 1963 Cor Jesu reads "This is Sacred Heart Academy. . . where we come to learn our faith. Within these walls we have made friendships, learned to accept and complete assignments, how to obey authority and how to adapt ourselves to the social life of a school. [SHA] has prepared us best to meet what we will face in the world of tomorrow."

I dare say that although 56 years may have passed since this was written, SHA is still very much the same. With daily religion classes, weekly school mass, on-going community service activities, annual retreats and many other faith-based opportunities, our students develop a strong foundation of what it means to be the face of Jesus and to serve, especially *continued on page 8*

I know that if any of us are ever in need, even 35 years from now, the rest of us will drop everything and come running (okay, maybe walking by then).

If I could use one word to describe what makes Sacred Heart Academy special, it would be *relationships* relationships with God, students, staff, families, alumni, and friends. There is a connection and a bond at Sacred Heart that is very special. Are we perfect? No, we are not. We are human and make mistakes, but the relationships we have sustain us in good and bad times. It is my hope that all students and their families have a relationship with someone at SHA, a relationship that is special to you.

As we enter into the blessed Christmas season, I want you to know how grateful I am for you, and for your dedication and commitment to our school. Thank you for sharing your gifts with us, especially the gift of your children. May God always bless you.
