WHO ARE YOU?



The girls finished with a 22-5 record as they recorded the sixth regional championship and the second trip to the state championship game (2007-08). HOMECOMING HONOR



State Champion Debate team members **John Johnson '63, Janet Johnson Patrick '64**, and **Kathleen Gallagher Mellon '64** were honored as Grand Marshalls at Homecoming 2013. Although Kathleen was unable to attend, their coach from 1962 and 1963, local attorney Loren Gray, joined in the celebration. Pictured during the football game halftime recognition are, from left, Johnson, Patrick and Gray. JOHN JOHNSON had the honor of opening the students' homecoming assembly earlier that day. John, who worked at the U.S. Treasury before beginning a 27-year career with the World Bank, has also been a professor at two universities, including Georgetown. Being fluent in three languages allowed him success in his financial work and travel on five continents. In brilliant fashion—and in less than five minutes—he offered valuable words of wisdom, which serve as a message to all youth. He told the

student body they should pride themselves on solid writing, foreign languages and speaking skills. "In the business world today, there are several keys to success," he said. "If you are unable to communicate, to articulate your message, your success in life will be limited." About WRITING, he said, a surprising number of students are not capable of basic writing skills. "This carries into the professional world. It is a skill you need and will use." Regarding LANGUAGES, John reminded: "We no longer live in a mono-cultural world. We should know the common language, but it is not the only language. Learn Spanish, learn French. It will help." The value of SPEAKING SKILLS, he said, cannot be understated. "In face-to-face context over the years, I cannot tell you how many times I have seen where those who can speak 'on their feet' have the advantage," he told the group. A former State Champion debater and coach of the 1964 team, John encouraged the students to participate in classroom debates and forensics opportunities to make themselves better presenters. "It will pay off," he promised.

ACADEMY NEWS

My elevator speech is too long...It's true. I learned in business years ago to always have a sharp "elevator speech". This 30-second-to-two-minute summary about your company or organization should be compelling, passionate and - more than anything - concise. I have the passionate and compelling part down. No problem. The opportunity to discuss faith-based education in today's world, where an investment in your child's future is the most important decision you will make? Very compelling. In a position like mine, with my own children enrolled at Sacred Heart, how could I not be passionate about encouraging others to attend? Check. Concise is the hard part for me. With all the advantages Sacred Heart Academy has to offer, it is hard to narrow down the list.

See if you can help me:

• Safe, caring, family-oriented community - it warms my heart when I see an Alum bring their child in for registration, wanting the same experience they had. The sense of family here is very real with DK through 12 on the same campus. Students have opportunities to collaborate together; and younger kids connect with the older kids in a positive manner.

• **Catholic school, welcoming all faiths** - Although Catholic faith is the foundation of our school, nearly 30 percent of our student population is comprised of families of many faiths. We offer a community where belief in God is part of the every-day environment, not only part of religion class.

• Specials! Spanish, Art, Music, Physical Education, American Sign Language (ASL) and Computers - SHA is the only local school with elementary Spanish. Our youngsters recently experienced a virtual Spanish trip, staging every aspect of the travel, including applying for a passport and filling out customs paperwork, with high school students serving as custom officials, pilots and airport security. American Sign Language exists in DK through 6 classrooms. The ukulele program in our elementary school is also one-of-a-kind in the area, not only building music appreciation, but interest in instrumental music as well.

• **iPad integration** - The positive impact of this iPad classroom program is yet to be discovered. The Apple education consultant invited to our school told us we have the perfect environment for iPad integration for learning due to our class sizes and focus on academics. We are fortunate to have these types of opportunities thanks to parent-donor investments.

• High academic standards - Teachers know what each student is capable of and hold students accountable. Small class sizes lend themselves well to collaboration between the students and people know each other on a personal level, whether student-to-student or teacher-to-student.

• Strong parent/teacher communication - Size is an advantage when it comes to communication with parents. Expectations are outlined and concerns are addressed when needed. Teachers are

able to spend more time teaching because they have less disruptions in class and students work toward a common goal.

• Moral and faith development - Similar values are shared at home and at school. In a mildly conservative environment, where dress code, manners and respect are prevalent, students can capitalize on spiritual opportunities provided through retreats, weekly Mass, field trips, service learning and community involvement.

• Academic Resource Center (ACR) - This tutoring service, available after school, is staffed by SHA faculty and National Honor Society students. Its purpose is to provide students with extra help in all subjects. It is remarkable to see older students helping younger students and assisting their peers. The ARC is another way older students build bridges with younger students and become leaders.

• **Career counseling** - The SHA Academic Advisor meets individually with each student to review his/her test scores and make sure the student is taking appropriate classes based on abilities and plans for the future. This individualized service begins in middle school and continues (at a minimum) on a semester basis throughout high school.

• **Involvement** - At Sacred Heart, everyone knows and cares about each other. There is a sense of pride which comes with the comfort of a family environment. Our school depends on parental support and involvement. Parents and alumni graciously bring the real world to life through their involvement in the classroom; donors invest in the Academy's annual SHAgala dinner auction or purchase items off the teachers' Wish Lists; and the Academy is supported by the SHA Foundation.

The term "elevator speech" comes from the scenario of an accidental meeting with someone important in the elevator. If the conversation inside the elevator is interesting and value-adding, the conversation will continue after the elevator ride, or end in the exchange of a business card or scheduled meeting. Every day I meet with important people: Alumni and friends, current parents and co-workers, prospective parents and community contacts. It is my privilege to represent Sacred Heart Academy and you can see the challenge I have keeping my bragging - my elevator speech - to a minimum.

Dear Alumni and Friends,

Every day, students at Sacred Heart Academy learn about God's love. The Gospel values of love, respect and compassion are taught and practiced at our school. Our students are given the opportunity to put faith into action through community service and their behaviors. This is why I am especially proud, not only of the achievements of our students, but of the longevity and commitment of our teachers and staff, who set a fine example for our young people.

Student-for-Student program

I am happy to share with you the success of the Student-for-Student program designed and introduced last year. Now in its second year, this student mentoring program has brought about an obvious positive change in our environment. Junior and Senior students greet seventh and eighth graders in the hallways by name. Younger students are willing and ready to learn from their older student leaders. Opportunities exist to match personality interests, but also for acceptance of differences and, more importantly, understanding of the unique and individual characteristics people have.



In society today, middle and high school students tend to be judgmental as a group. As a result, students feel they have to be "tough" or behave in ways they normally wouldn't, just to fit in. Our Student-for-Student program, which offers opportunities for 12-

to 18-year olds to interact in positive ways, is an ideal way to model leadership behaviors and let everyone be part of something good. For example, something bigger than the drama of 7th grade. When younger students are accepted by their older peers, the values of respect, love and compassion become real.

The goals of the Student-for-Student program, supported by a grant from the Mt. Pleasant Area Community Foundation, have been successful thus far:

- Teach older students to be leaders
- Students experience a sense of community
- Welcome younger students and show acceptance of individuality

The program was student-initiated and remains student-led. Students are strategically assigned to multi-grade-level small groups, separating certain similarities and life circumstances, which allows students to gain awareness and respect for individual qualities. Activities sponsored at least every-other-month have promoted the success of program, the size of the school gives us an advantage, and the support of the teachers and staff is key. "Choose kindness" is the slogan students remember and exemplify - and it works!

Staff Recognition

In May, 12 employees will receive service awards for their years of dedication to Sacred Heart Academy. Again, our size gives us an advantage: We have 44 full time teachers and staff members; 32 have 5 or more years invested, and 23 have over 10 years longevity. (By the way, I'm in that group now. Fr. Don tells me I have served longer than any other Principal in school history.) In addition, 11 have over 20 years of service. I am proud to work with this team. Alumni In Action

What he enjoys most

When it comes to Sacred Heart, **Terry Coughlin** is like the Energizer Bunny. He keeps going, and going, and going. Named 2013 "Alumnus of the Year" for his never-ending commitment to the Academy, Terry downplayed the honor, saying he only does what anyone would do: help the school any way he can. And Terry's way is with his whole heart. He fries the fish at the Friday Night Fish Fry, he fixes the softball scoreboard, he does maintenance behind-the-scenes, and countless other good acts to benefit the school auction, the parish festivals and golf

outings. "My dad has always been generous with his time to the community, his friends and especially Sacred Heart," says daughter Cindy Jacobs '89. "SHA is part of him and he would do anything for the school or church. I am proud and blessed to have

him as a dad. He is the greatest man I know!"

A graduate of the Class of 1956, Terry has lived his life with God, family, country and community in mind. He served in the U.S. Army, returning home to marry Evelyn Clare, a local girl. They have three children, all graduates of SHA, **Terry Jr**, **83**, **Scott '86** and **Cindy Jacobs '89**, in addition to five grandchildren. Over the years, Terry served on the SHA School Board and the SHA Athletic Association, in addition to other volunteer committees and work crews.

He fondly remembers hooking up the electrical connection for a fryer in Nancy Fitzpatrick's classroom for one of the original fund raising fish dinners in the early '80s. The Fish Fry idea outgrew the classroom, moved to the cafeteria and then to the Parish Center, where the Lenten Friday Night Fish Fry was made famous. Terry continues to work tirelessly each year to ensure success of the program, shopping for the best-tasting, top-grade fish at the best price, and putting in his time on the prep team and the fry team.

As SHA nears its 125th anniversary, Terry says the quality education, the class sizes and the sense of community are the most important aspects of the school. Those features were important when he was in school, he said, and they are still of value today.

Terry farms 80 acres northwest of Mt. Pleasant, enjoys deer hunting at a Chippewa Lake camp, and plays a "little bit of golf", but says what he most enjoys is helping Sacred Heart. "I like doing it," he says. "I wanted to be involved with my kids and then I just kept doing it."

GOD, DREAMS, PASSION

"If you don't at least try, dreams become regrets." **Forrest** "Jim" Youngs, from the SHA Class of 1963, made this message clear to the Class of 2017 when he spoke in the classroom as part of the "Alumni in Action" program last fall. Coming back to Sacred Heart after 50 years away, Jim told the ninth graders he was privileged to attend SHA and will never forget his school years.

"When I was in high school, Disneyland opened," Jim told the group. "The Cold War was underway, and the polio vaccine was introduced. These were significant happenings of the time. Not to mention Elvis Presley was all the rage. He could not be shown on television below the waist because of his swiveling hips."

The life Jim described to the current prep students was much different. From the price of gas to the weekend activities to the



music and more, Jim made references to the world especially the school life—which made him what he is today. But some things don't change, he said. "You need to keep God in your life. This is very important," Jim said.

1985 Grad Shares Lessons He Learned

He is a 1985 SHA graduate, as are his two younger brothers, **Brad '88** and **Jeremy '93.** He has three children currently enrolled at the Academy, and currently coaches middle school football for the Irish. He is a former SHA School Board member and a current Sacred Heart Parishioner. To say alumnus **Keith MacDonald** is connected to his alma

"There are many things I appreciate about SHA," he told the ninth grade classes as a guest speaker last fall. "Faith is a priority in the classroom, and it's small enough that no one gets lost in the crowd." Keith, who respects the pride and tradition of SHA, shared his career path, along with three

pieces of career advice when he spoke with the students, giving examples from his life and sharing anecdotal stories.

First, he told them: All things down the road are driven by what you want to do with your career or life, so it is never too early to start planning.

Second: Nearly every career is attainable, you just need to work hard and talk to the right people. It won't fall in your lap. Third: At some point, there will be consideration for others (besides you) in your career decisions.

Keith has put these lessons to the test. A finance graduate of Central Michigan University, he worked as a plastics salesman gaining valuable experience. He received his MBA from the Eli Broad School at Michigan State University, then performed an internship with the U.S. Treasury during the Clinton Administration. He took a job with The Dow Chemical Company and progressed to his current position as Manager, Liability/ Joint Ventures/Mergers and Acquisitions Insurance Programs.

When the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) offered him a position in 1999, Keith passed on the "dream opportunity" out of consideration for his wife, family and the Dow role, saying he has no regrets. Keith says his faith becomes more important to him every day, and his family and hobbies keep him fulfilled. Keith is a reserve deputy for the Midland County Sheriff's Department, a professional ski instructor (Level 2 Alpine Certification) and a certified strength and conditioning specialist.

In his classroom presentation he told the ninth graders, "don't discount anyone along the way" [in your life], and "try never to be in a hurry". This is good advice for any age, courtesy of Keith MacDonald.

A self-described "old soul" and "off-the-beaten-path-kind-ofperson", 2009 SHA Graduate **Sigourney Seybert** has experienced a lot of life in her young years. She has been fortunate enough to travel and learn extensively in Europe, Spain, Mexico and South America. She is a graduate of the University of Michigan, where she was a member of the Varsity Rowing Team. She feels a deep connection to her parents and siblings, including sister Kelly, brothers Garrett, and **Aaron '99**, and their families.

Her true passion, though, is what she does. Sigourney is a full-time missionary with Great Commission Ministries (GCM). GCM is a non-profit organization which represents 100 Christian churches and has over 400 missionaries in 14 countries, including El Salvador, where Sigourney spends six months each year. Her mission trips are 100 percent support-based. In the off months, Sigourney is responsible for personal fundraising for the opportunity to return.

Originally planning for a career in medicine, Sigourney took a Mission trip as a freshman at U of M and said she felt like she left part of her heart there. Sigourney says Sacred Heart Academy is an important chapter of her life which prepared her for the role she now leads. She spoke in the ninth grade classes last October and said the service hours she performed in high school not only forged relationships she would treasure, but also helped her college admission. Sigourney is especially thankful for the teachers at SHA, saying, "It is a rare blessing to have teachers who care so much about you as a person."
