2017 SHA ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME


Three outstanding athletes will be inducted into the SHA Athletic Hall of Fame at halftime of the Homecoming game on Friday, September 22, 2017. The 2017 class of inductees includes Steve Fox '87, Hedlun Walton '92 and Michael Hackett '96.

Steve Fox graduated with nearly all of the single season and career passing records and MVP and All State honors while quarterbacking the Irish for three years. He also earned All District honors on



the #1 ranked state runner-up baseball team and finished 5th in the state in the low hurdles. Steve works in Special Education for the Gratiot Isabella Regional Educational School District and lives in Mt. Pleasant with his wife Heather and their three daughters.

Hedlun Walton is one of only six players to score over 1000 career points in boy's basketball, currently ranking 4th on the all-time list. His teams were 56-12 in his three seasons on the

Frank attended SHA in his high school years. He was a member of the SHA 1933 Class C State Championship Football Team, and still tells vivid stories of the team today. They enjoyed 67 years of marriage, making a life in Lansing, raising children and continuing to make trips to Mt. A TITAN AMONG US

Thirty years ago, in senior mock elections, **Jim Goenner '87**, was voted "the luckiest" by his fellow graduates. Today, he says, he still feels like "the luckiest person in the world".

However, Jim has worked hard to create that luck. He is the President and CEO of the National Charter Schools Institute, an educational organization which offers support and training for charter schools. He's passionate about education — to say the least! — and works hard to make a difference every day for students across the nation. Jim says his own education at Sacred Heart Academy started him on the path toward this mission.

He credits SHA for his passion for education. He remembers study acronyms from Sr. Thaddeus such as GO — "get organized" and FTD — "follow the directions". Jim enjoyed sports and being with friends in high school and says he was "pretty good at just being a kid". He attended college at Grand Valley State University, where he also played baseball, earning a degree in business. He worked in sales while he waited for his high school sweetheart, Theresa Audretsch '89, to complete her degree in education at Central Michigan University. While he was waiting, he earned a teaching certificate himself, and a master's degree in school leadership, finishing the same year as Theresa, in May, 1993. The two were married eight weeks later and the union has created seven children: Luke and Ben, who are '12 and '15 graduates of SHA; and Kate, Mark, Laura, Nicole and Natalie, who span the grades at the Academy. Kate is a 12th grader and Natalie will be an incoming Kindergartner this Fall.

Just after college, Jim was a substitute Math teacher at SHA. He also coached JV baseball with **Pat McDonald '88**. He was

a graduate assistant at CMU, and taught business communication and computer classes for Mid Michigan Community College as well.

When CMU became the first University in Michigan and the nation to issue charters in 1995, Jim joined CMU's Charter Schools Office. Later, he helped found and lead the Michigan Association of Public School Academies and the National Association of Charter School Authorizers. In 2010, Jim left CMU and began leading the National Charter Schools Institute. He was inducted into the National Charter Schools Hall of Fame, and has shared the stage with titans of industry such as Bill Gates (Philanthropist and co-founder of Microsoft) and Betsy DeVos (U.S. Secretary of Education). Jim is truly committed to the mission of the Charter Institute, which is to improve education for our kids and our country. "Education is transformative," he says. "The power of a great education is inspiring, and leads people to believe in their God-given potential. This is the kind of coaching I was meant to do."

In his role, Jim works with public policy, gives keynote presentations, and helps train clients along the way to improved performance. He focuses on practical advice, and never forgets the real goal is making work better for our kids and our country.

Just before this interview for the Alumni News, he had been in Washington D.C. at an event with lawmakers. Later in the week, he was scheduled to be with teachers and students at a school. At home, he says, "I'm still 'just a dad', who chooses Catholic education for my kids, and attends a lot of softball, baseball and basketball games." In a discussion about SHA, when noting that the bricks and mortar of the school haven't changed much (and the boys' bathroom looks pretty much the same as when he was there), Jim said, "What's most important is what hasn't changed: The teachers, the staff and the coaches make SHA special. The community of parents and families look out for and support each other."

"I am lucky," Jim said of his family, his work and his life. "I am blessed in so many ways. But I'm also pretty humble. I try to keep things in perspective. Luck doesn't come easily. You have to work really hard, and deal with some tough times, too."

CHAMPIONSHIP HALL

This past spring, through the efforts of some generous SHA alumni and friends, our athletic/gymnasium entrance received a long overdue facelift. Next time you attend an athletic event, in addition to a fresh coat of paint, you will see some impressive decals on the walls highlighting exciting athletic events and our school logos. Additional lighting has been installed in the show cases, and the trophies and team pictures have all been nicely organized to highlight historical state championship and runner-up accomplishments on one side of the hallway, and current year's athletic accomplishments on the other side.

We are very proud of our athletic accomplishments at the Academy and truly appreciate the efforts of our dedicated Athletic Association. They organize several fundraisers throughout the year including athletic sponsorships, the Lenten fish fries, an annual lottery, and a new "app" sale kicking off this August. Because of them, we are able to avoid any pay to play fees. When our students pass through this hallway on their way to gym class or an athletic event, they know they are amongst champions as not only have the athletes been successful on the field, court, course, or track, but also in life. Many of them continue to give back to the school and athletic programs.

For alumni, their connection to the Academy through the sports they played and their teammates is very important.

As I walk by the Hall of Fame and into the Championship Hall on a daily basis, I'm humbled by the accomplishments of so many and by their continued generosity and support of the Academy. I encourage you to nominate yourself or a classmate for the Hall of Fame.

In looking at the 1976 State Champion Boys Basketball team, several of the team members participated in our Career Day held during Homecoming Week 2015. **Doug Bunting, Bob Horan, Pete Cotter (all '75)** and **Bill Myler '76** served as presenters for the opening panel. The 1996 Baseball State Championship and 1997 Baseball Runner Up trophies include the names of **John Hunter** '97 and **Scott Pieratt '96** whose children David (7th) and Dylan Hunter (5th) and Eliza (7th) and Grady Pieratt (5th) currently attend the Academy. The dads both help with coaching and in other capacities at SHA. Also listed on the baseball state championship trophy is assistant coach, Ken MacDonald, grandfather to current SHA students Lance (12th), Lauren (11th), Hank (3rd) and Walter (1st). Ken still serves as assistant coach and lends a hand at each Lenten Fish Fry in the Spring. There are plenty of other examples where the athletes and/or coaches featured in the show cases are still supporting the Academy reminding our students that these individuals truly are champions.

In all, there are 18 state championships showcased which include five in baseball (1967, 1968, 1970, 1971, and 1996), four in football (1933, 1970, 1971 and 2010), three in girl's cross country (1999, 2015 and 2016), two in boy's basketball (1967 and 1975), and one each in cheerleading (1997), girl's basketball (2014), boy's cross country (1977), and boy's golf (1985). Altogether, SHA has had 28 state finals appearances.

WHAT TEACHERS MAKE

Teacher: The Webster's dictionary defines a teacher as "one that teaches; especially: one whose occupation is to instruct."

Many years ago it was a teacher's job to arrive early, light the fire, shovel the walk, and so on. While that work must have been difficult, today's teachers have even more responsibilities. Today's teachers not only instruct, they counsel, coach, have basic nursing responsibilities, provide moral direction, and much more. This poem from Taylor Mali speaks volumes:

What Teachers Make

He says the problem with teachers is What's a kid going to learn from someone who decided his best option in life was to become a teacher?

He reminds the other dinner guests that it's true what they say about teachers: *Those who can, do; those who can't, teach.*

I decide to bite my tongue instead of his and resist the temptation to remind the dinner guests that it's also true what they say about lawyers. Because we're eating, after all, and this is polite conversation.

I mean, you're a teacher, Taylor. Be honest. What do you make?

And I wish he hadn't done that - asked me to be honest - because, you see, I have this policy about honesty: if you ask for it, then I have to let you have it.

You want to know what I make? I make kids work harder than they ever thought they could.

I can make a C+ feel like a Congressional Medal of Honor and an A-feel like a slap in the face. How dare you waste my time with anything less than your very best.

I make kids sit through 40 minutes of study hall in absolute silence. No, you may not work in groups. No, you may not ask a question. Why won't I let you go to the bathroom? Because you're bored. And you don't really have to go to the bathroom, do you?

I make parents tremble in fear when I call home: Hi. This is Mr. Mali. I hope I haven't called at a bad time, I just wanted to talk to you about something your son said today. To the biggest bully in the grade, he said.

"Leave the kid alone. I still cry sometimes, don't you? It's no big deal." And that was the noblest act of courage I have ever seen.

I make parents see their children for who they are and what they can be.

You want to know what I make? I make kids wonder, I make them question. I make them criticize. I make them apologize and mean it. I make them write. I make them read, read, read. I make them spell definitely beautiful, definitely beautiful over and over and over again until they will never misspell either one of those words again.

I make them show all their work in math and hide it on their final drafts in English. I make them understand that if you've got *this*, then you follow *this*, and if someone ever tries to judge you by what you make, you give them *this*.

Here, let me break it down for you, so you know what I say is true:

Teachers make a difference! Now what about you?

Mrs. Maddocks' students and alumni wrote their own version of "Every Thing I Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten." Mrs. Maddocks, we will miss you. We hope you enjoy your well-deserved retirement and that you visit often. Words aren't enough to describe what you have meant to Sacred Heart Academy. You have touched hundreds, possibly thousands of lives, and we are eternally grateful. Thank you for everything you have done and have been to us. We love and appreciate you!

Another retiring teacher we are very grateful to is Mrs. Marge Schafer. Mrs. Schafer began her teaching career at SHA and then, years later, saved the best for last and returned to Sacred Heart Academy to teach an additional five years. Thank you, Mrs. Schafer for coming back to us and shaping young minds. We wish both Mrs. Maddocks and Mrs. Schafer the very best in their well-deserved retirements. We'll see you both in the choir!


