Wendy is passionate about Catholic education and it shows in all she does for the Academy. "My parents (Jim & Karen McConnell) taught us to always stand up and advocate for what is right, to always be kind, and to give back when you can. They gifted me, my sister **Amanda Jasinkiewicz '95**, and my brother **Nick '97**, with a wonderful faith-based education. At Sacred Heart Academy, I was reminded daily to be community-minded. I learned to be independent, become a leader, and strive for excellence in all areas of life," she said.

Wendy says she gives back because she wants to see SHA thrive for another 133+ years. She also wants her children to experience exactly what she did at the Academy. "I want them to be passionate about giving back and be enthusiastic learners and youth leaders."

"SHAgala was always a perfect way for me to give back," Wendy said. "I wanted to support the teachers who support our students in and out of the classroom."

Grand Marshal 2023 Damon Brown to lead parade

Damon Brown started coaching at Sacred Heart Academy in 2003. He was the JV girls basketball coach for 5 years and then became the Lady Irish Varsity coach for 15 successful seasons. His coaching record includes 11 District Titles, 7 Regional trophies and 9 Conference championships. Damon led the IRISH to four semi-final appearances and appeared in two State Championships, winning the 2014 title. His overall record is an impressive 287 wins against only 69 losses.

For the mark he leaves in SHA athletic history, and for what he means to the athletes he coached and their families, Damon Brown will be honored as the Grand Marshal of the Academy's 2023 Homecoming festivities.

Damon said it was easy to "fall in love" with the girls basketball program at SHA. There was something different about the culture and I wanted to be part of it. "Mark DeNoyelles had created something really special and I wanted to keep that going," he said. "I also felt a commitment to the athletes coming up. I wanted to make sure they understood what it meant to be part of the Lady Irish basketball program."

Each varsity season had a theme which was unique to the team, for example: P.R.I.M.E., Count On Me, Compete, UMBUNTU, One Team, One Goal, Arete (Latin for "Pursuit of Excellence"), and Tradition. "Each team was different and each theme represented that team. "Count on Me" was the theme for the 2014 State Championship team. That year," Damon said, "We only had seven players on varsity. The players made a commitment to each other that in spite of the low number, their teammates could count on them to give 100 percent each game. You could actually hear the girls say it during the state championship, which was pretty cool. "

Damon said the teams always looked forward to finding out what their theme was each year because it was something which tied them together.

"I'm still in shock that 20 years have gone by," he said. "The years run together but the amount of love I have for each team and the players makes my cup runeth over. The success we had as a program has nothing to do with me, but everything to do with the girls committing to be a part of something bigger than themselves. They believed in a vision and culture, and they committed to making sure that when they left the program as a senior, they left it in a better place than they found it. That honestly fills my heart the most! To hear alumni players talk about their journey today still warms my heart."

Damon says coaching basketball at SHA was never about the wins, championships and banners. It was always about the girls. "I hope they remember their journey in the program and how this program changed them for the better. Basketball is a lot like life. You win some days, you lose some, but it's what you do next that matters. How do you respond the next day? That was always the lesson I preached to each team," Damon said.

Damon taught his players a lesson he learned first hand. He and his family had some losses off the court. When his wife Keisha, a former SHA principal, counselor, and coach, developed breast cancer and was in the fight of her life, Damon said the SHA community fought right alongside her. "There aren't enough words to express how I feel about this community. That is one of the main reasons my daughter Angel and I stayed in Mt. Pleasant after Keisha passed," he said. "This community has been amazing. It takes a village to raise a child and our village was second to none. There were always caring people when I needed them. The rides home, places to hang out after school—so many reasons why SHA means the world to me. I can never say "thank you" enough to this community."

The Angel Wings Fund was also created during his coaching tenure at Sacred Heart. "While the Angel Wings Fund is named after Angel, I believe Keisha was inspired to create it because she was moved by the outpouring of love and

I'm thankful to those who gave me the opportunity. I never thought I was going to be a coach. I was just trying to find a way to spend time with Keisha. Yet along the way I discovered a passion for coaching. I really can't find words to express what this means to me. All I can say is "Thank you" to the SHA community for the love and support through the years. While I'm not a graduate of Sacred Heart, the love and admiration I have for this school sure makes me feel like one! "
