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### **Church Cornerstone**

The laying of the corner stone of the Catholic church was accomplished in due form Wednesday in the presence of a very large audience. Bishop Richter was assisted by Revs. Father Crowley, Father McNamara and Father Lefevre in the ceremonies which were conducted entirely in Latin. services were solemn and impressive. The stone which is a large one-2 ft. 6 in. by 2 ft. 8 in. and 20 in. high-was mortised on the bottom to receive the tin box containing various souvenirs in the way of documents, coins, etc. At the proper time in the ceremonies the box was placed in the mortise and cemented and the stone placed in position. The south face of the stone has these words carved into it: "Church of Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, 1888." A large cross appears on this face and also upon the other two sides exposed to wiew. Part of the ceremony included the sprinkling of the walls around the entire church with water that had previously been blessed at a point where the altar will stand. After the ceremonies the people all assembled in the church where a very strong and interesting sermon was delivered by Father Thomas McNamara. "The "Church of Most Sacred Heart of Jesus" will now be pushed to completion and will be anedifice of which all will be proud.

The enrollment at Sacred Hear! academy, far from being brought down by the war, is greater than ever, the number of children in school being 350. One hundred and six are in the high school department. The growing demand for business education necessitated the addition of a commercial course to the regular high school courses. Although the courses begun cannot be laid aside or even divided, many of the pupils are undertaking the new commercial work.

The music department gives promise of being as well patronized as formerly, the number of private pupils increasing daily. The orchestra looks forward to great advances, especially since the purchase of new drums and wind instruments.

The last week in September, the literary society will elect officers and outline its work for the year. The society expects to secure C. E. W. Griffith, Shakespearian reader, for readings from King Lear, Hamlet, Macbeth and Julius Caesar, the last of October.

This makes a total enrollment, outside the Normal training school, of 987. Allowing 250 for the training school, the city would have a school enrollment now of 1238, and that will be increased probably ten per cent.

Graduation and citizenship are kindred terms and should be synonymous. Graduation is not necessarily citizenship but all good graduates are of a necessity good citizens.

It is also of auspicious omen that young women should predominate in such numbers. Girls are such puzzles that fathers and mothers hardly know what to make of them. As one mother writes of her daughter:

"She is my sorrow, my laughter, my gloom and my Joy,
And having no son, she is my girl and my boy;
She is my pest and my pleasure, my crown and my cross,
She is down in life's ledger as profit and loss;
She is a trial, God bless her, and what is much worse,
She's an enemy both to my pantry and purse; It is also of auspicious omen that

and purse; She's a tease and a torment, faults, blunders and all,

God lead, guide and save her lest

worse shall befall.'

But it is right that higher educa-tion shall be hers. The teaching pro-fession and educational field has to a great extent been monopolized by the fairer sex, for women are both by nature and grace the natural preceptors of men. We went come and preceptors of men. tors of men. We want our representation in the schools of the land that our women may by their works and merits vindicate the system of cath-olic education. But it is also of happy moment for another reason, to give back again the lie that the church has ever held women in subjection, that she is an afterthought in creation, has no soul and is not the equal of man. A woman's education is the education she is capable of receiving and the use she makes of it in life. The church has ever been the champion of woman's welfare. She has always taught that woman is the very heart of society and that no education is too high nor accomplishment too great to prepare her for her sublime calling in life and to-night may God bless the hands that are to lead the little ones in the paths of justice, may He bless the eyes that are to watch over the straying feet; may He keep the ears that are to listen to their tender cries, and bless the lips that are to feed them the bread of life. Their calling is indeed sublime. It is the hand that leads the youth that is the hand that leads mankind, and holy writ tells us that they who instruct many to justice shall shine as stars for all eter-

It is a consolation to see so many of our young men finishing their course of studies. The grandest incourse of studies. The grandest inheritance a man can receive is a christian education not only to take them out of the mud, to place them with the princes of the people but to make them factors in the progress and development of the race. The teaching field in education will be practically a closed profession to them. The machinery of our educational system is in the hands of unbelievers and infidels and for any position of note no Catholic need apply. We are educating free of charge in We are educating free of charge in our own university of Michigan the Japanese, the Hindoos, the Cubans and the Mexicans but there is no support or remuneration for an American youth if he happen to be of (Continued on page 4)

the household of faith. Do not be discouraged You may be barred from the educational profession but there is one thing that you can not be barred from and that is from being Christian gentlemen and loyal American citizens which you were taught to be in Sagred Heart Academy

to be in Sacred Heart Academy.

Products then as you are of the catholic principle that men and women are created for things supernal and as Carl Marx says, "that all education is but the process and development and expansion of the human soul, you are going forth tonight not only to do and to be something, but to represent in life her who made you what you are, to do credit to them who gave you the light of day but also to the Church whose children you glory to be. The world is going to expect much and demand much of you and it has a right to do so. Of him to whom much is given much shall be asked. Education is not learning, education is character, and the Catholic school is the greatest human character-constructing agency given to men. She has not only a good theory but she has the only possible system of character-building as long as man is built as he is, as long as human nature is composed of body and soul. The world is going to expect something of you because all that is best in human thought and experience has

been drilled into you that you might go and bring forth fruit. This city and county are going to expect much of you because on the roster of Sacred Heart Academy stands a host of men and women she can be proud of, and it is expected of you that you shall keep her shield unsullied. And I want to say here to-night that as long as this school and her kindred institutions shall continue to turn out the products they are turning out, that there is little danger to our American institutions,—to democracy, good government, or Americanism.

The good, kind sisters, who have labored so long and well, who hid away their light in the dark that yours might shine, are going to look for some recompense from you in the good you do, in the lives you lead, in the examples you give. Your laurels are theirs to-night and a life of gratitude could never repay what they have done for you. Rev. Fr. Brogger, who has played with you, who has worked with you that this 'night might be, expects much of you; your reverend pastor is not only going to expect much but he is going to see that you return measure for measure. His hair

now is gray and his feet sore running after you these years and there is no joy in life he experiences so much as the joy when he sees the faces of his boys and girls and hears of their success in life. Lastly, the whole country is going to expect much of you because of who you are and what you are. I want to say right here to-night that we consider you real, genuine, thoroughbred Americans, that your blood has not been tainted, neither has your judgment been warped, nor your patriotism dimmed because you have spent the first years of your youth in a Catholic school. I say this because the real question of the hour in education is, are Catholic education and Americanism compatible terms or is there strife between catholicism and true, genuine American patriotism. Are we going to allow the congressmen to transfer with the Smith-Townley bill in education the seat of autocracy from Berlin to the shores of the Potomac?

# COAL STRIKE HITS MOUNT PLEASANT

# DEALERS ORDERED TO RESTRICT DELIVERIES

No Deliveries to Those Who Already Have Coal

The coal strikers, 400,000 of them, walked out Saturday in the soft districts, as had been threatened, and now except for a few mines operated by non-union men, no soft coal is being mined. The national fuel administration has been resurrected and all coal in transit was seized, either by the government or by the railroads, and dealers who had coal in their bins received orders not to deliver coal to anyone who already had any on hand.

Monday the Enterprise, in view of the local condition, interviewed the several dealers in this city and found that at that time the stock was exhausted. Three dealers had no soft coal at all, while one had about 25 tons of Pocahontas, 50 tons of cannel or grate coal, and about 60 tons of coke.

It was said by one dealer that probably two-thirds of the people of this city had no coal at all, or very little, at the most.

The Central Gas Co. has coal on hand to run the plant about 30 days. This company also has a limited supply of coke, but until there is some certainty that more coal can be had, the coke on hand will be kept to feed the boilers in case of emergency. Coal already sold will be delivered, and it is possible a little might be spared in case of suffering, but the company is desirous of first being able to continue the gas plant in operation as long as possible.

It is very evident that if the strike should continue long, there will be suffering here. A little wood can be purchased, but the most of it is light wood and for heating purposes is not very effective.

Central State Normal is supplied with enough coal to last till about the middle of December under usual conditions.

The city schools are fortunate in having a supply till about the first of February.

Sacred Heart Academy has supply enough to last about two months.

## FIRE INSPECTORS GIVE MT. PLEASANT SCHOOL FINDINGS

#### Verbatim Reports Of Insurance Group Wednesday

#### CONDEMN KINNEY SCHOOL

#### High School

600 pupils. No fire drill ever held. Hold semi-monthly drills.

Keep both parts of double class room doors unlocked.

Provide panic bolts on all exits from gymnasium balcony and outside exits. Make gym benches fast to floor.

Stand holding gas heated glue pot in wood working shop is loose and must be made rigid.

In basement; Remove boxes under stairs in old building. Storage under stairs should be discontinued. Accumulation of rubbish in old building should be removed.

Filled sand pails should be provided in woodworking shop, and on stage, for electrical and oil fires.

Wool blankets for physics laboratory and domestic science rooms, to extinguish clothing fires.

Install closed fuse cabinet on stage, and keep locked.

Throughout the building: Install chemical fire extinguishers. Erect approved fire escapes. Install fire gongs, to be heard throughout building. Make all classroom doors open outwards. Protect heating pipes where where they pass through wood. Discontinue use of floor oils. Remove obsolete desks and equipment.

#### Maple School

126 pupils. Time of fire drill 45 seconds.

Building over 25 years old.

Protect floor over furnace with asbestos.

General housekeeping should be improved in basement.

Stock room under south main exit should be removed.

Fire alarms should be provided for all floors.

Gas plate should be equipped with rigid pipe.

Not sufficient extinguishers.

Doors should be equipped with panic bars, and single exits should be made to open more easily.

There are no fire escapes. They should be provided.

Leaky eavestrough over north main entrance should be repaired, as ice forms and is dangerous in case of hasty exits.

#### West Side School

45 pupils. Time of fire drill 60 seconds.

Remove paper in wooden box in basement.

### TRIUMPH IS SCORED By Academy Players

#### Production Is Presented a Second Time By Request

A triumphant performance of "Seven Keys to Baldpate" was given by the senior class of Sacred Heart academy on June 14, the brilliancy of their achievement being greatly enhanced by the fact that the manuscript of the play was not received until a very late date, giving the members of the cast only seven days in which to memorize their parts, stage and rehearse the entire program.

Charles Murray did effective work as old Elijah Quimby, a somewhat difficult character part; Georgiana Dilion as Mrs. Quimby gave distinction and individuality to a rather colorless part; James McNamara gave an intelligent and well-balanced per-William Hallowell formance as Magee, the leading character; James Naumes made the difficult role of Lou Max stand out by sheer hard work and earnestness; Katherine Keenan in the part of Mary Norton was a good foil for James McNamara; Helen Naumes was a gracious, dignified Mrs. Rhodes; John Keenan gave an intelligent performance of an eccentric hermit; Estella Kaiser was well cast as Myra Thornhill and did splendid work; Clement Carey distinguished himself as Lou Max, an ex-convict; Thomas Kane did excellent work, delivering his lines with conviction and assurance; James O'Sullivan's interpretation of the pompous Mr. Hayden was well done, and John Burch as Chief Kennedy had a part which fitted him like a glove.

The dramatic situations were well handled and the suspense ably sustained. Altogether it was a splendid performance and reflects great credit on the boys and girls who took part in it.

The play was repeated by special request on June 17. This performance, however, was somewhat marred by the two officers of the law who, left too long with the unguarded paintpots, found themselves unable to resist their lure and consequently made their appearance upon the scene of their activities in clownish red and white makeups and borrowed plumage of no particular vintage or significance-this to the great surprise of the other, members of the gast and the utter consternation of the faculty. This ill-timed boyish prank was a rather bad flaw in an otherwise smooth and efficient performance. and the police officer who had so sigmally distinguished himself at the original performance failed rather dismally on this latter, occasion, since his interpretation of the part was wholly incompatible with his makeup and dress.

#### Tolerance

One of the finest examples of tolerance ever recorded in Michigan was seen in Port Huron on Armistice Day, and we believe that everyone who had a part in it or witnessed it, went home with a better feeling of patriotism and good will

A man of Jewish faith donated a flag pole to the Methodist church in that city and the pastor decided to dedicate it on Armistice Day. To that end, he invited the American Lemon to take charge of the ceremonies. The organization of war veterans chose one of its chaplain-heroes, a Catholic priest to dedicate the flag-pole to the country. The flag which was raised on the pole was donated by the Klan, despite the fact that the Methodist pastor has for many years been an active antagonist of that organization. The flag was dedicated by the Methodist and raised to the top of the pole by a negro member of the American Legion.

Of course there was a storm of protest from certain people of the community who have not as yet thrown off a certain handicap of narrow-mindedness. The Methodist pastor received a note before the event telling him there would be four hundred men on hand to prevent the ceremony, but he fearlessly went ahead with the plans, which carried thru without interference and no one went to the hospital as far as could be learned.

A parallel ceremony, with only a little less variety was held in Mt. Pleasant on the same day when the new flag-pole and flag was dedicated at the Catholic church grounds. The flag-pole was given by a Catholic, the flag by the senior class of Sacred Heart Academy, dedicatory speeches were given by four Protestants and a Catholic. The flag was raised by the American Legion and the Indian school band furnished the music.

Events of this nature, whether they be at home or abroad, tend to bring all of us to a better understanding of each other, of what it means to be a true American, tolerant, peace loving, respectful and considerate of the rights and beliefs of others.

Religion, after all, is not so much a matter of this creed or that, one church or another; but rather a true sincerity in one's beliefs, no matter what they may be, that the whole world may be a better, happier, more enjoyable place in which to live in friendship with our neighbor, our fellow-citizen, our brother American.


