Where Jesus, Saviour, comes to dw.



Coach Warren Giese is a veteran of three years of service with United States Navy during World War II. He was with the V 12's at C.M.C. From there he went to Cornell University where he received his commission of Ensign. He was then sent to Miami, Florida, and then to Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. Giese served as skipper of a Crash Boat, and also as athletic officer. He received his discharge from Great Lakes, Chicago, June 1, 1946.

Coach Giese has received eight letters in college, four in football and four in track. He has eight years of football experience, two years in high school, three in service and three in college. He is the shot put record holder at C.M.C.E. and captain of the 1948 track team.
