




The "Irish" opened their 1950 football season with St. James of Bay City, and also with high hopes of a second consecutive undefeated season. Hugh Connors scored the first two tallies after taking pitchouts from quarterback Dick Marzke. Harry Quinlan scored in the fourth quarter on almost the same play. Hugh Campbell set up the first Academy score when he blocked a shamrock punt deep in enemy territory.

Poor quarterbacking proved costly to the Shamrocks. In the fourth quarter they needed only one yard for a first down, but they threw two straight passes in a futile attempt to pick up the necessary yardage.

Coach John Murray was pleased with the Academy line, which held Bay City to only six yards in the first half. He singled out Campbell, McDonald, and Sowle for special mention, along with Verwey and Connors for their play in the backfield.



St. Marys Flint 12-6

Spearheaded by the hard running of fullback Bill Hovey, the Sacred Heart football team defeated Flint 12-6 for its second straight victory of the season. Hugh Connors scored both Academy touchdowns.

After an exchange of kicks in the first period, the "Irish" started a drive from its own 35-yard strip, halfback Connors and Hary Quinlan picking up most of the yardage to St. Mary's 20, where Marzke's pass to Connors was complete for a touchdown.

Coach John Murray said Hovey's running was the standout feature of the game although he credited the line with a good performance. Don Landwehr and Jack Dibble turned in very good jobs at their familiar tackle slots.





St. Marys Bay City 34-13

Sacred Heart Academy ended another unbeaten football season in a blaze of glory by running roughshod over previously undefeated Bay City St. Marys 34-13. The one sided victory ran the Irish win streak to 18 straight games, while marking the second year in a row the Sacred Heart gridders have marred an otherwise perfect record for the St. Mary's eleven. The biggest reason for Sacred Heart's easy victory was all over team speed.

Marzke cracked off right guard for the first touchdown and Hovey ran the extra point which started the game with a 7-0 score. Harry Quinlan picked up 43 yards in three plays, sparking the Irish to St. Mary's 32. Then Marzke connected on one of his two completed aerials of the day, good for 32 yards, to Pat Quinlan who raced into the end zone for another touchdown. Marzke drove through center for the point and Sacred Heart led 14-0 at the half.

St. Marys displayed its offense to the best advantage early in the third quarter by driving straight down field to the "Irish" 5. The threat ended when Hovey picked off one of Dick Smith's aerials, but Harry Quinlan fumbled on the "Irish" 8. Three running plays moved to the 5 yard line and a fourth-down pass was batted down by Marzke ending the threat.

Sacred Heart took over on the 10 and on the first play Harry Quinlan broke over left guard and with beautiful blocking ran 90 yards for the third touchdown of the game; Verwey added the extra point and the score was 21-0.

After the kickoff Dibble intercepted a Shilleagh pass on the Bay City 28, and it was Harry Quinlan again running off left guard 28 yards making the score 27-0. Two beautiful touchdown jaunts of 28 yards by Verwey, and 45 by Harry Quinlan were nullified by major penalties.

Starting on the Shillilagh 35, Quinlan and Martin sparked a drive that carried to the Bay City three yard marker, from there Connors went through center to score. Martins off-tackle buck was good and the score stood 34-0.

Dibbles' line play reached the height of an excellent varsity career, while Speedy Quinlan scored on dashes of 90 and 28 yards. Coach John Murray also had high praise for his seniors. Marinus Verwey, Bill Hovey, Hugh Connors, John McDonald, Tom Sowle, Bob Honeywell, Ed McShea, Tom Grisdale, Don Landwehr, and Bill Sowle, in addition to Dibble and Quinlan, for the excellent football they exposed before hanging the red and white glory on the hook for the upsurging freshmen, who will be the backbone of a probable successful season in 1951-1952.



In this game, the "Irish" put on a display of ground and aerial might that probably has never been equalled on Fancher Field as they handed the "Blue Wave" of St. Paul a stunning 44-6 setback. This was the fifth "Irish" victory, and it left little doubt in the minds of fans, that the "Irish" would enjoy another undefeated season. Marzke completed three touchdown passes against the "Blue Wave" which could hardly create a ripple against the unbeaten "Irish". The Owosso team's only touchdown came as the result of a fourth guarter sleeper pass from Mahaney to Basso that covered 67 yards.

Beal City 19-0.

Still looking forward to an undefeated season, the "Irish" tromp the Beal City "Aggies". The Aggies twice drove past the Irish 40-yard line in the first quarter but seemly lacked the punch to score.

We began to roll in the second quarter, as halfback Harry Quinlan climaxed a 70-yard march when he skirted right end for the first "Irish" touchdown. Moments later Jack Dibble intercepted Banniger's screen pass on the Beal City 31 and he jogged untouched down the side lines for another touchdown. Marzke then completed a 10-yard aerial to end, Pat Quinlan for the final touchdown, the final score shoved a 19-0 victory for the Red and White.

All Saints Flint 39-18.

Sacred Heart was fought to a stant 'ill for two periods by All Saints before the vaunted "Irish" offen. began clicking as they rolled to a 39-18 triumph.

Halfback Hugh Connors set up the fit score of the game, as fullback Hovey slashed through the middle of the Flint line for a touchdown, Dibble's kick was good and the "Irish" led 7-0.

Pat Quinlan scored next on a 27 yarc arial from quarter-back Dick Marzke, before Jim Miller scored air first 6 pointer.

Soon they followed with a 22 yard pass to be Curran, which spelled touchdown for Flint.

Surran scored again starting an entirely lew game. Harry Quinlan finally broke lose, when he scampered 37 yards off tackle Verwey made the extra point, making the score 32-18.

Only a few minutes later Connors circled left end for the final touchdown spelling "Irish" victory, 39-18.



Coleman 25-0.

The rain soaked field was hardly enough to halt the glorified "Irish", as they showed a victory determination not to be stopped by the Coleman Comets, nor the continuous rain.

Quinlan Hovey, Verwey, and Connors moved the ball steadly goalward throughout the game, while picking up 259 yards to the Comets 118.

Verwey scored the first of his two tallies on a one yard dive, which started the day's scoring. Later Quinlan raced for the second score of the ball game. A blocked punt by Jack Dibble set up the forth score, which was Verwey's making it 18-0.

Big fullback was next to reach the Comet's goal as he cracked over from the 3, Quinlan's extra point was good and the game ended 25-0.
