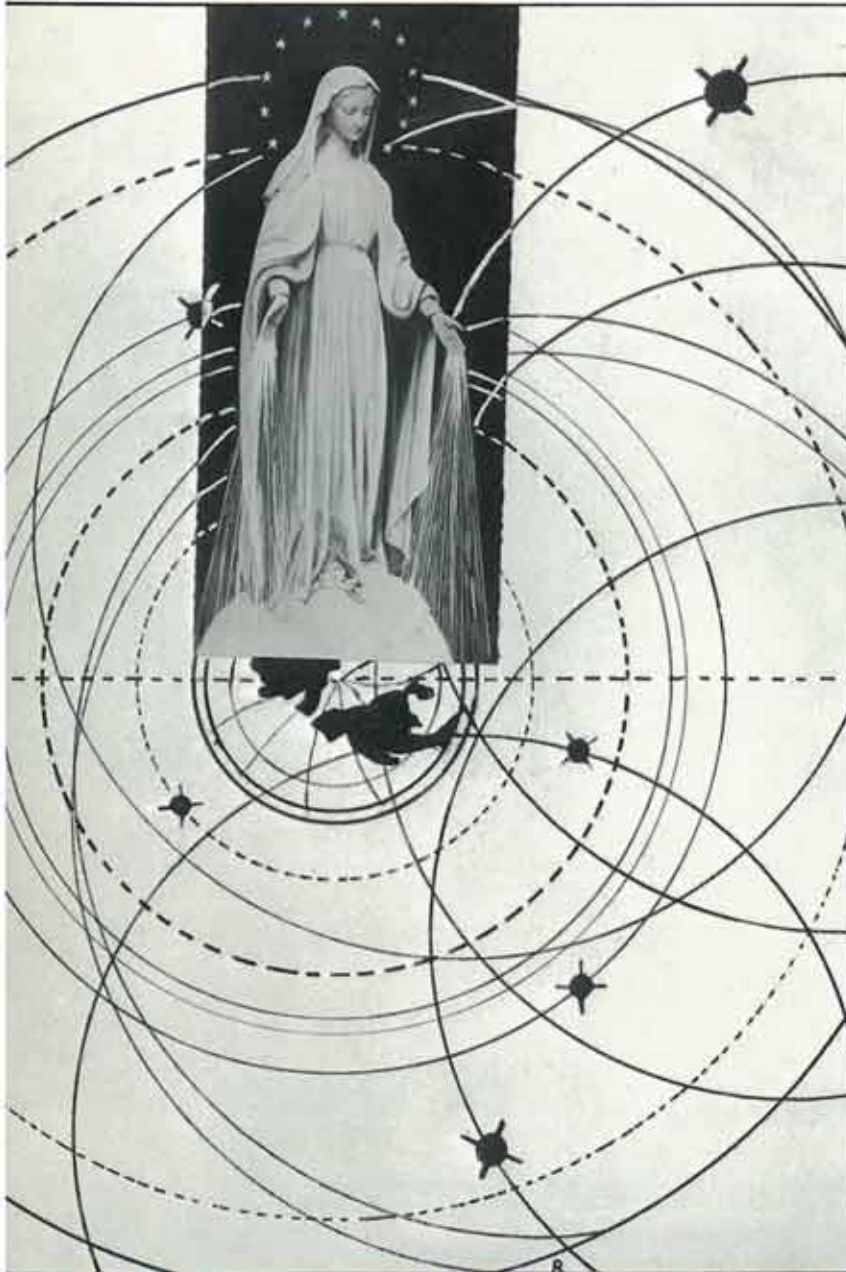

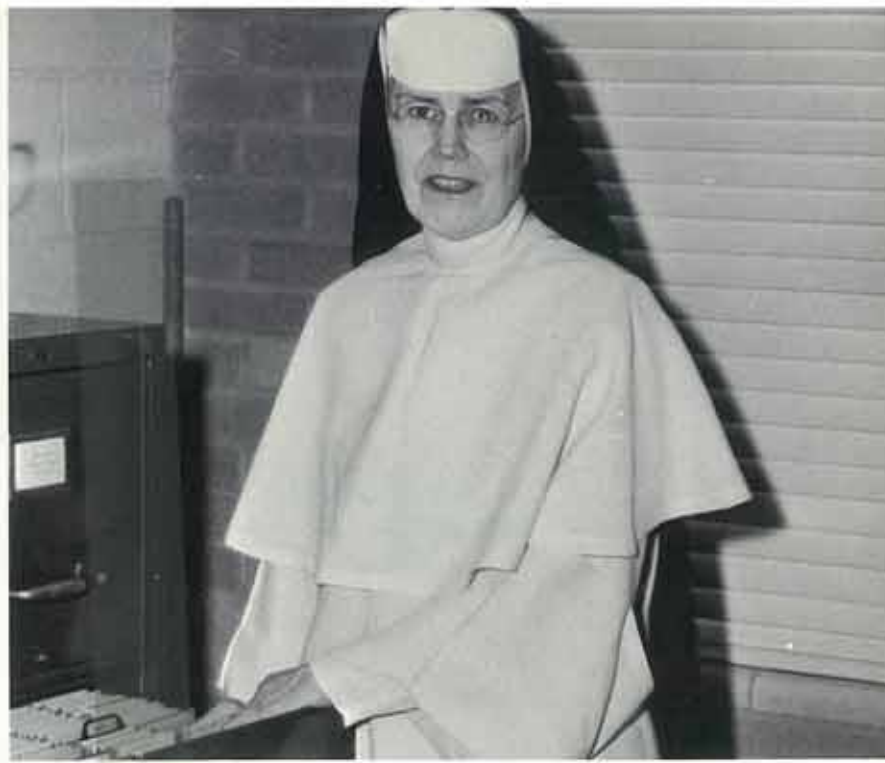

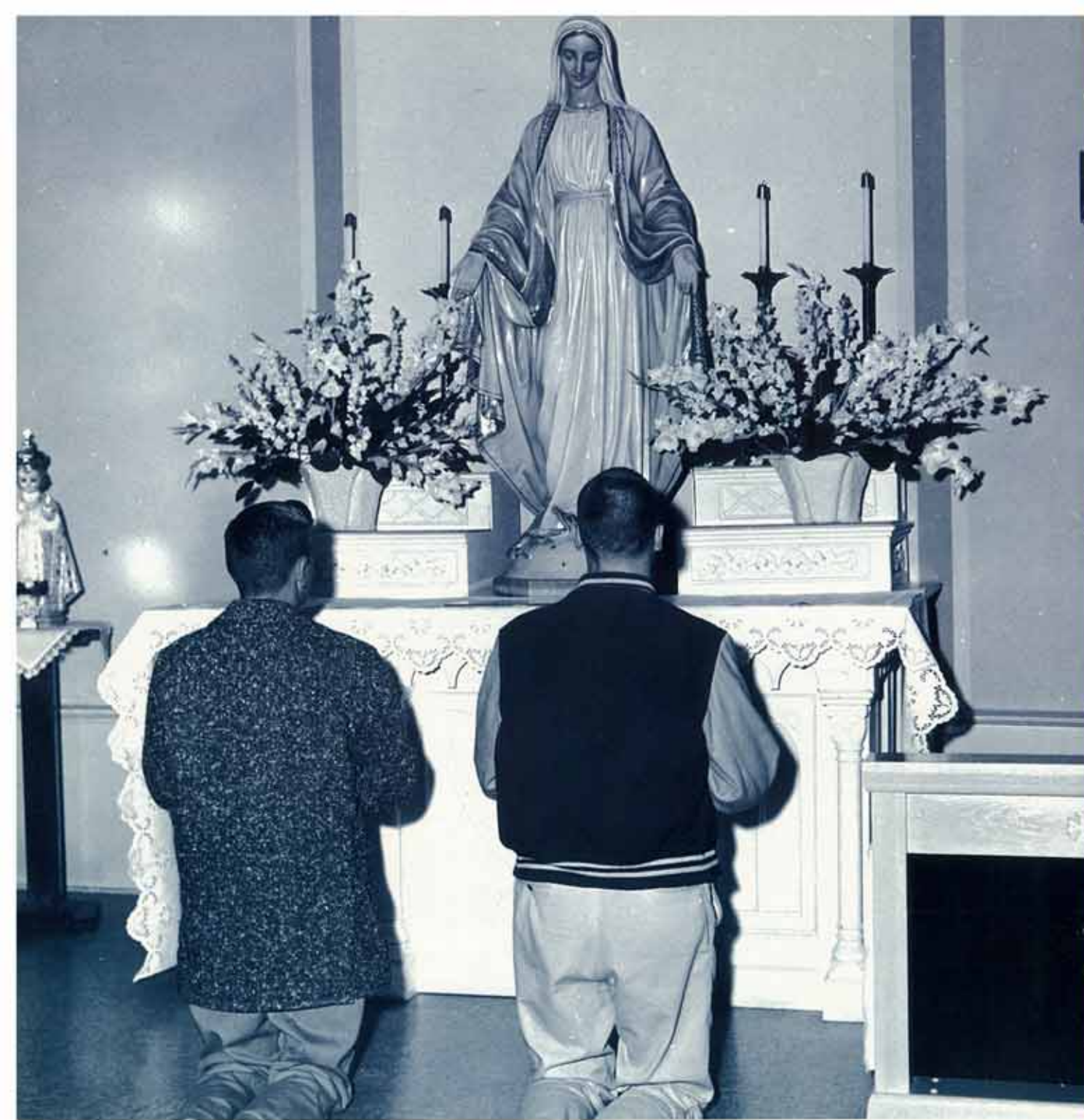


RELIGION

They Strive to Give More Perfect Service

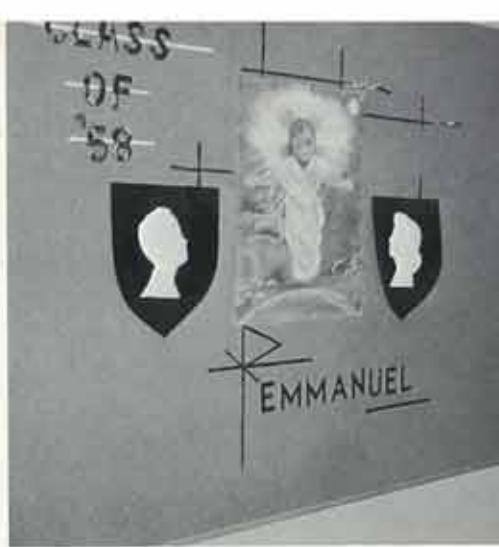

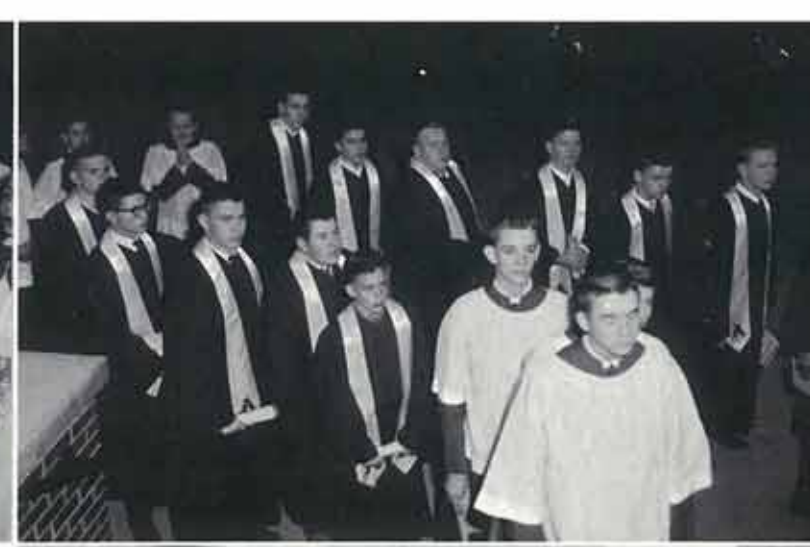

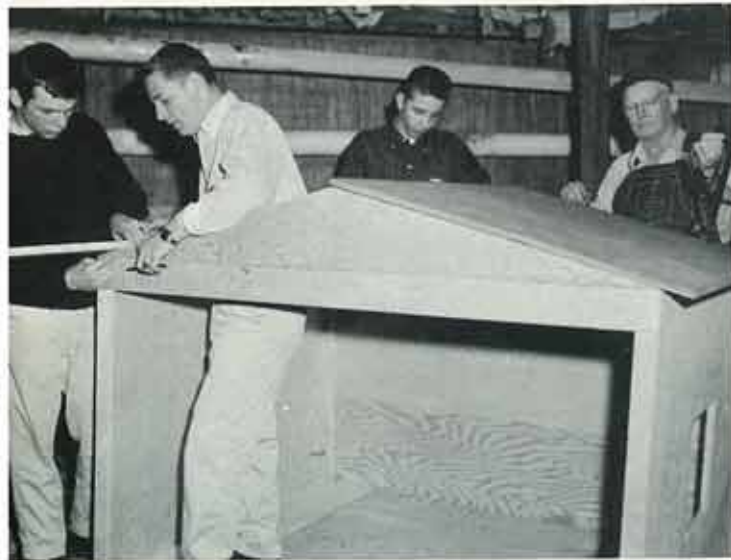

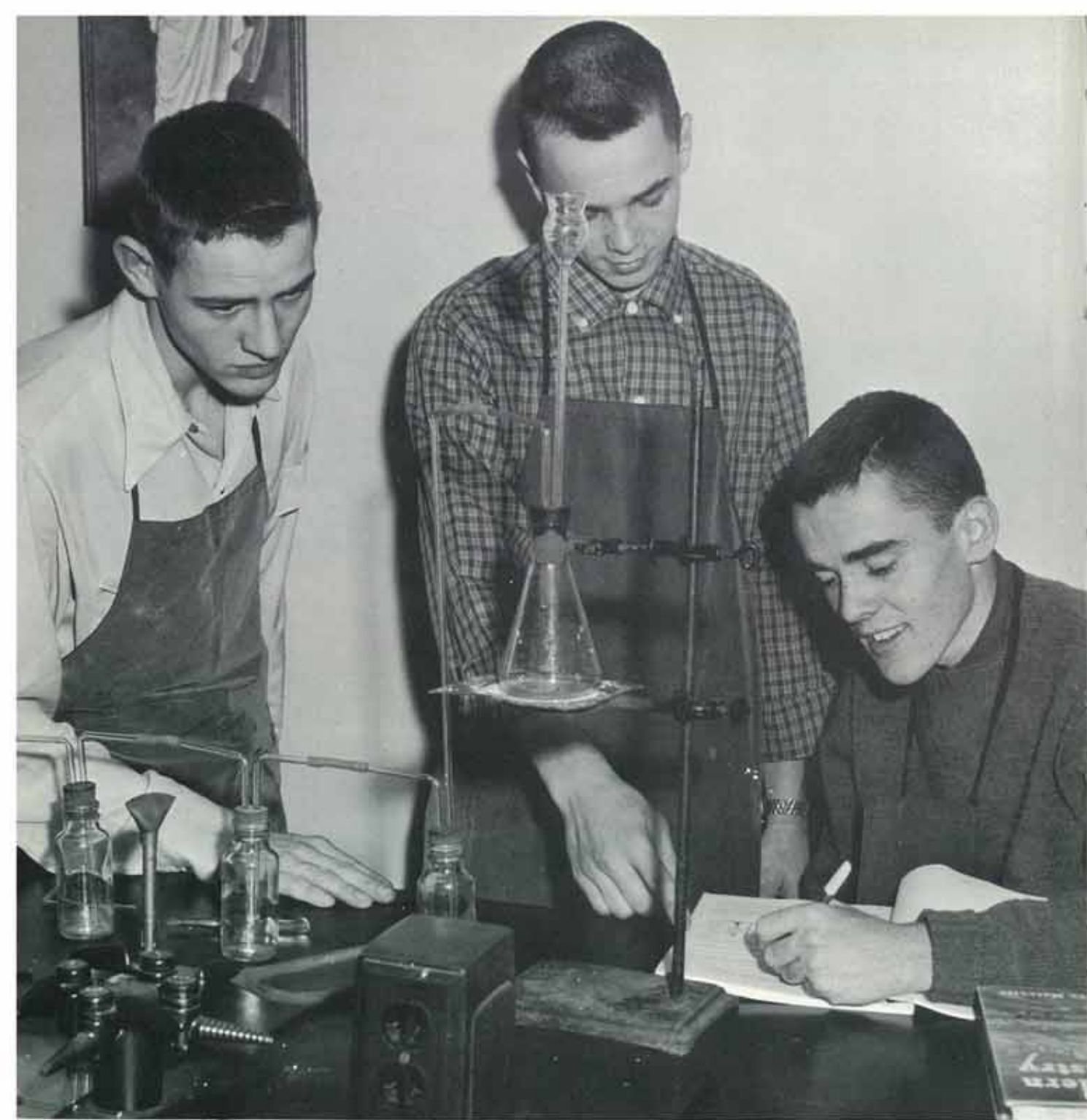


CLASSES

Of equal importance are the communication arts of English, forensics, and journalism, which have a prominent place in the curriculum. Students participate in state science and debate meets.



The Commercial department offers training in all courses to fit students to enter the business world after graduation. 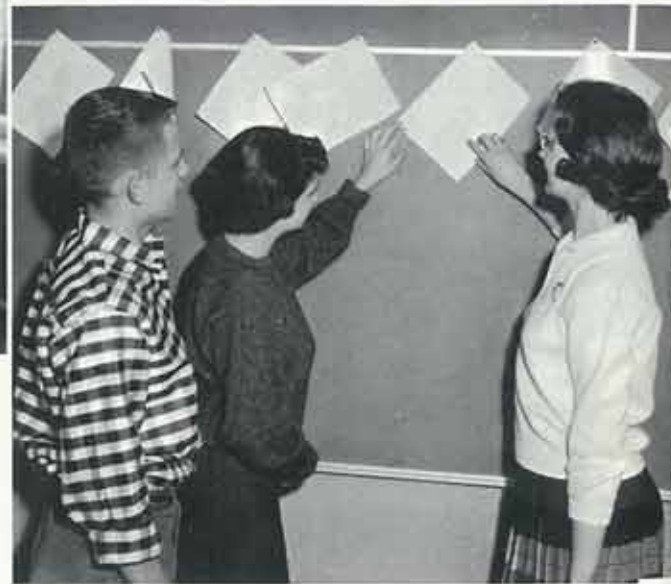

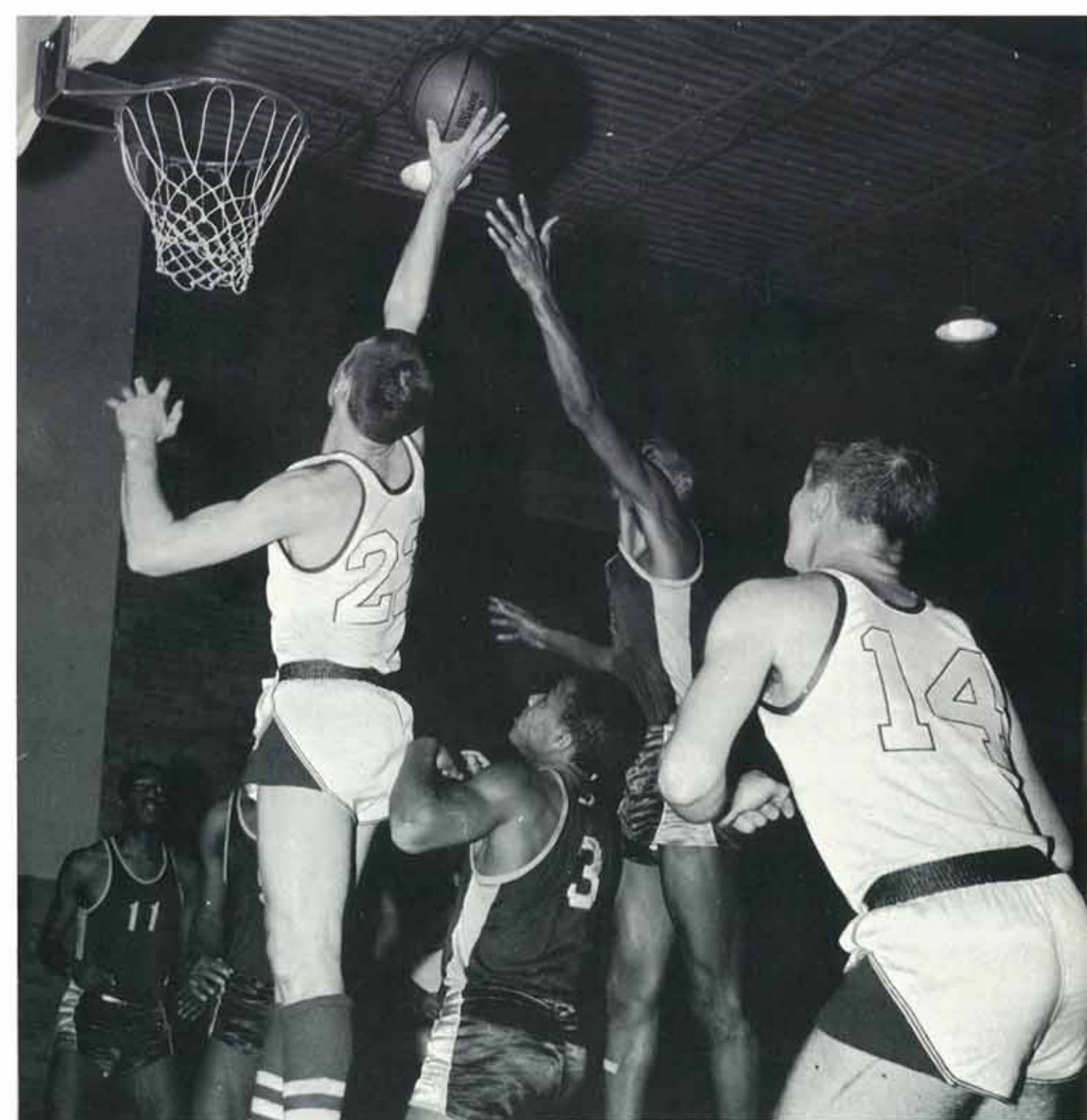


SPORTS

Team Rockets to VPL Championship

Undefeated! Conference champions! That was the record of the 1956 Sacred Heart Academy football team, The Fighting Irish, under the direction of head coach Phil Marazita and assistant coach Dean Hines, rolled through a schedule of seven games without tasting defeat. Only a tie with Shepherd High School marred the season. Included in the six victories were five conference wins which gave the Irish the 1957 Valley Parochial League 2nd Division Championship.

The Irish opened the season on September 21 with a night game against Shepherd at Alumni Field. The game was played under adverse weather conditions as rain turned the field to mud. Both teams scored touchdowns in the first half but neither could get an offense rolling in the second half and the game ended in a 6-6 deadlock.

The Irish then travelled to Owosso to battle Owosso St. Paul. After a scoreless first half, the Irish got going and swept to a 21-7 win.

On the following Sunday, the Irish met Bay City St. Mary. The Irish, weakened by the flu, were underdogs, but fought their hearts out and emerged winners in a 13-7 thriller.

The Irish then encountered Saginaw St. Mary. Despite the fact they were outweighed, the Irish romped to a 25-7 win.

Essexville St. John was the next team to fall before the Irish attack. Once the Irish got moving, they overpowered the hopeless St. John team, 32-7.

On October 27, the Irish faced Flint St. Agnes in the Homecoming game. The Irish were lucky to come out on top, 7-0, as the Flint team fought stubbornly to spoil the Sacred Heart Academy Homecoming.

The Irish wound up the season by taking on a huge Saginaw Holy Rosary team. The game was supposed to be close, but the Irish, needing the win to take the championship outright, were fired up and turned the game into a 31-0 rout. This was the last game in Academy colors for Seniors Jack Fleming, Larry Foreman, Terry Grisdale, John Harris, Ted McGuirk, and Gary Shaw.

Overall, the Irish had a great season by chalking up a total of 135 points while holding opponents to a mere 34. The 1957 squad of Sacred Heart Academy can well be proud of its record.

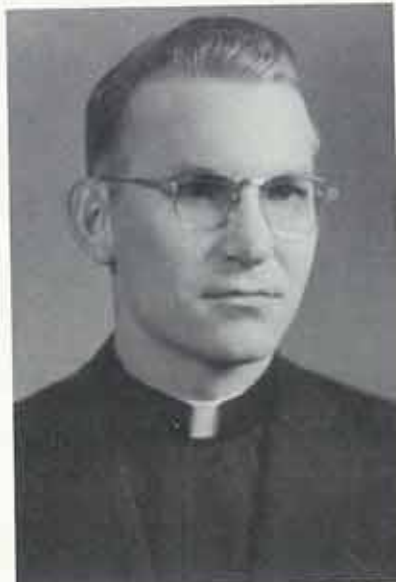

Sacred Heart Athletic program is well organized with "Fighting Irish" field teams in football, basketball, baseball, and track.

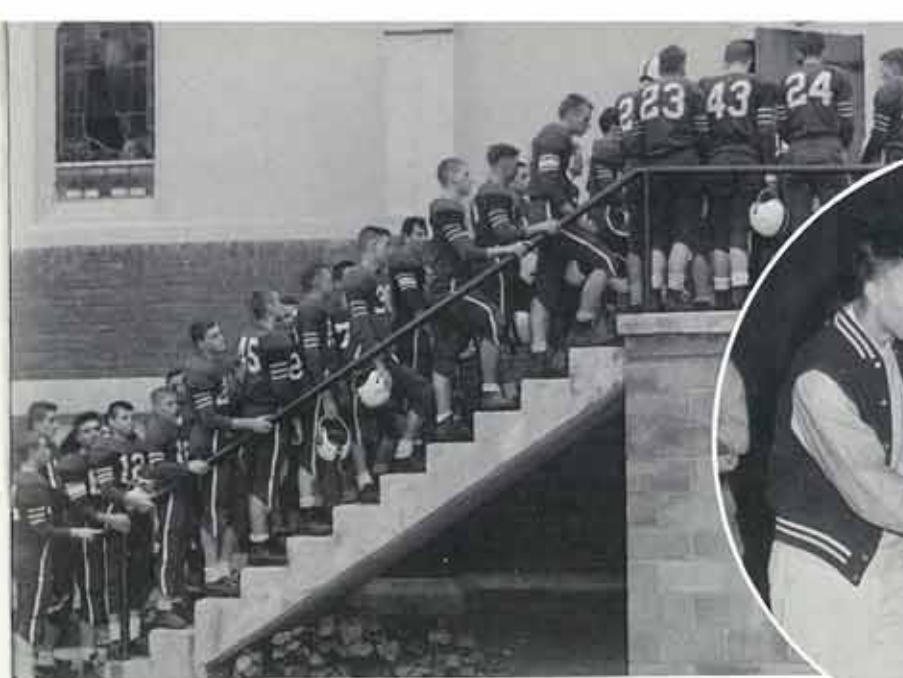

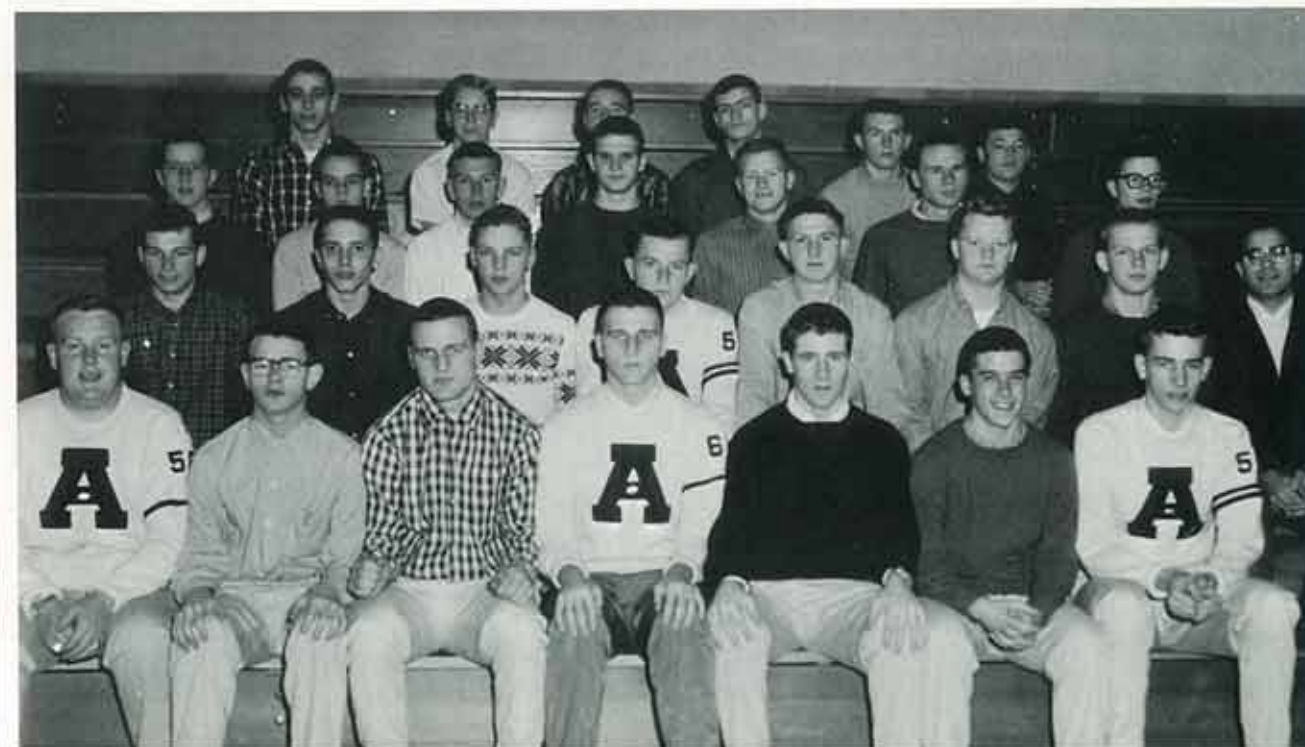

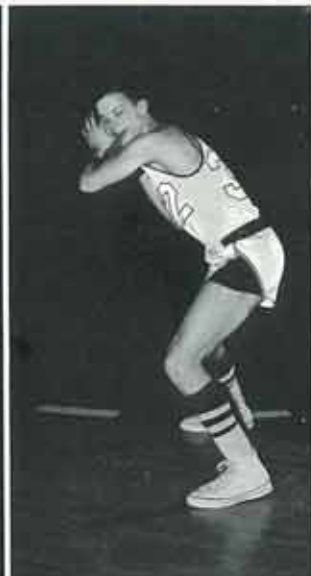
