




Religion





After the period at the State Home, Sodalists hold their weekly meetings.








WE Adore Thee, oh Christ . . .

The 11:05 Mass brings the day to a climax. The expressions on these faces indicate that the juniors, as usual, are early.



















Because of the findings of President's Committee on Physical Fitness, Academy steps up the program to improve girl's athletics. Attention also is given Mental Hygiene.









The Blue Jays of Shepherd were surprised to see the power and varied offensive which nearly upset them in the scond half of that opening duel. Here we became branded as a "second-half" team and remained thus for the rest of the season. Quarterback Jim Youngs did manage, however, to put across three touchdowns in the first half of the Bay City St. James, St. Mary, and Visitation games.

On October 21, the Edmore Panthers, the team that humiliated the Academy with a 56-6 defeat last season, fell before the gang-tackling, high-spirited "Fighting Irish" who were determined to pull the rug out from under Edmore and give the Homecoming crowd something to go home and talk about.




















