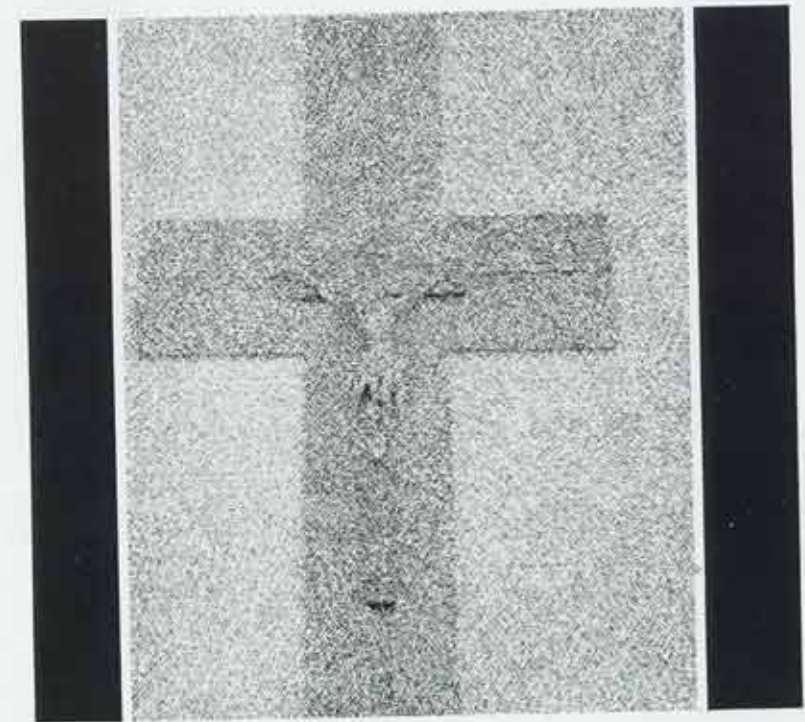

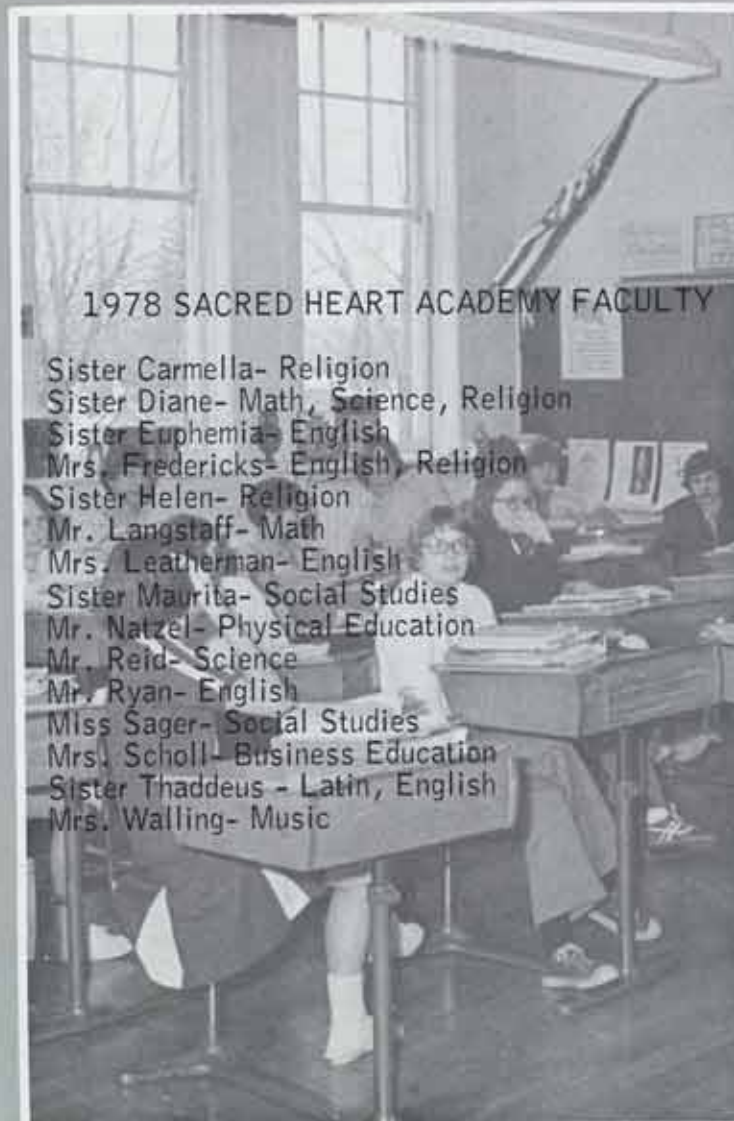

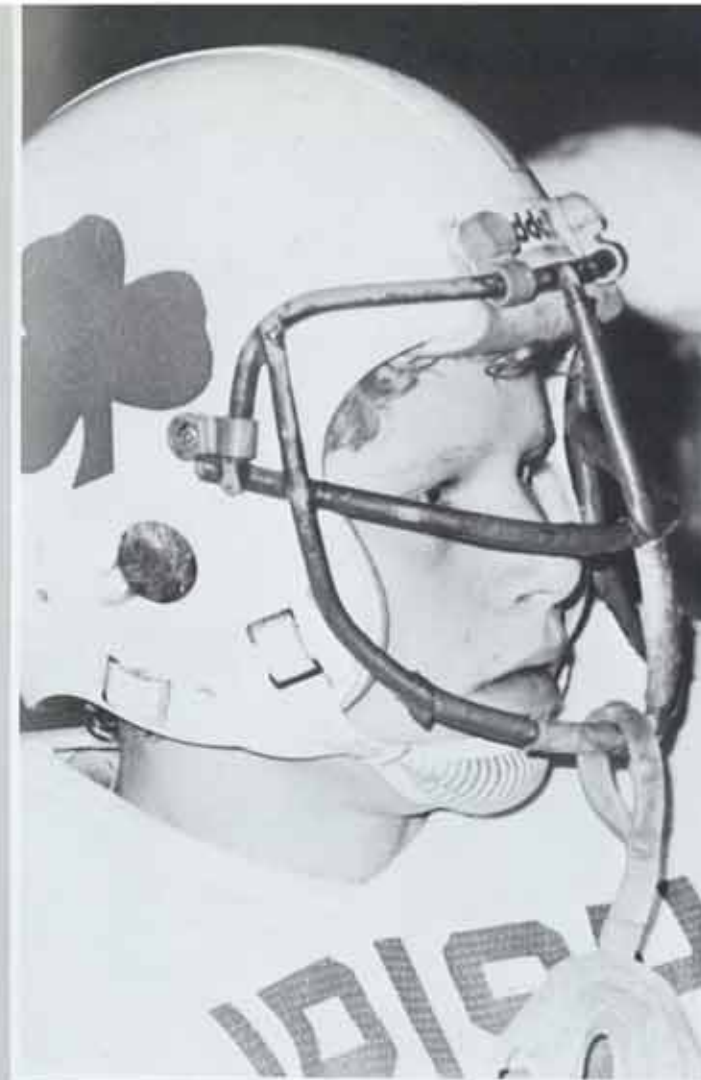


Irish Post Big Wins

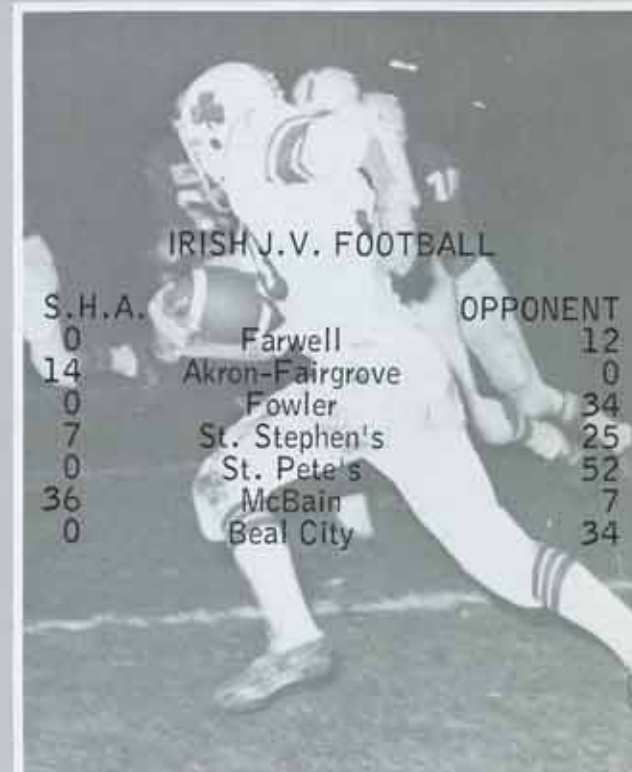

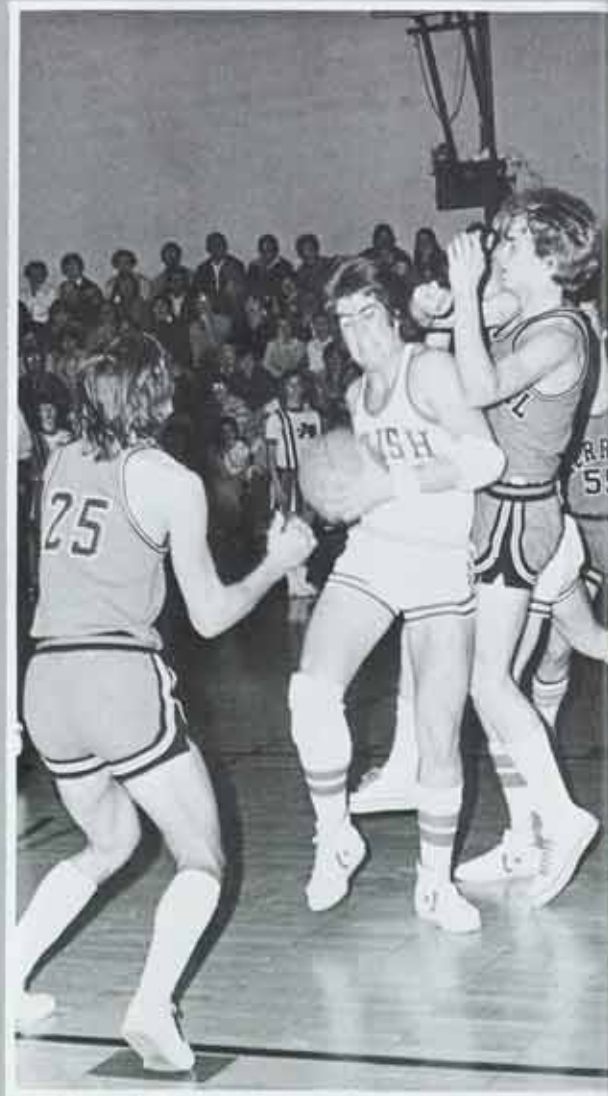

A run-and-gun offense, combined with spirit and guts, brought much success to the 1977-78 Sacred Heart Varsity Basketball team. All season long the Irish found themselves up against taller, and sometimes more physical teams. But as always their speed and passing ability brought them through as the team outscored their opponents 74.0 to 64.7.

Playing a schedule that consisted mainly of Class "C" schools, the Irish raced off to an early 7-2 record, and a place in the Class "D" rankings.

Although the team only had a 6-4 record for the remainder of the season, their enthusiasm was still present as they headed into tournament action. With a 13-6 record the Irish found themselves a heavy favorite to win their districts.

It looked as if the team would fulfill the predictions of a district championship with a devastating victory over Beal City, 70 to 49. The dream was shattered, however, as the Irish fell to a determined Vestaburg 51 to 54 in the final game.

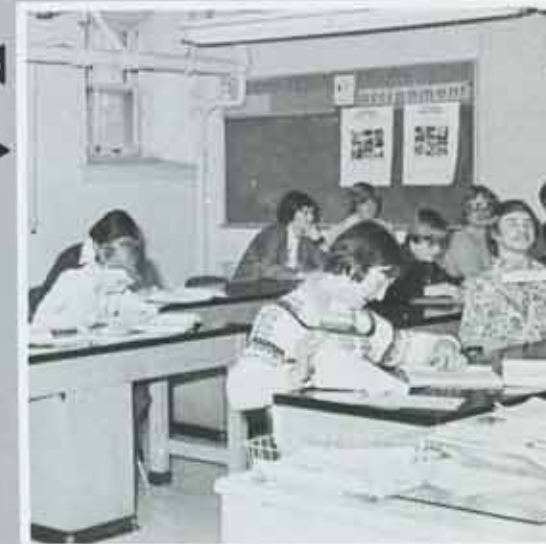
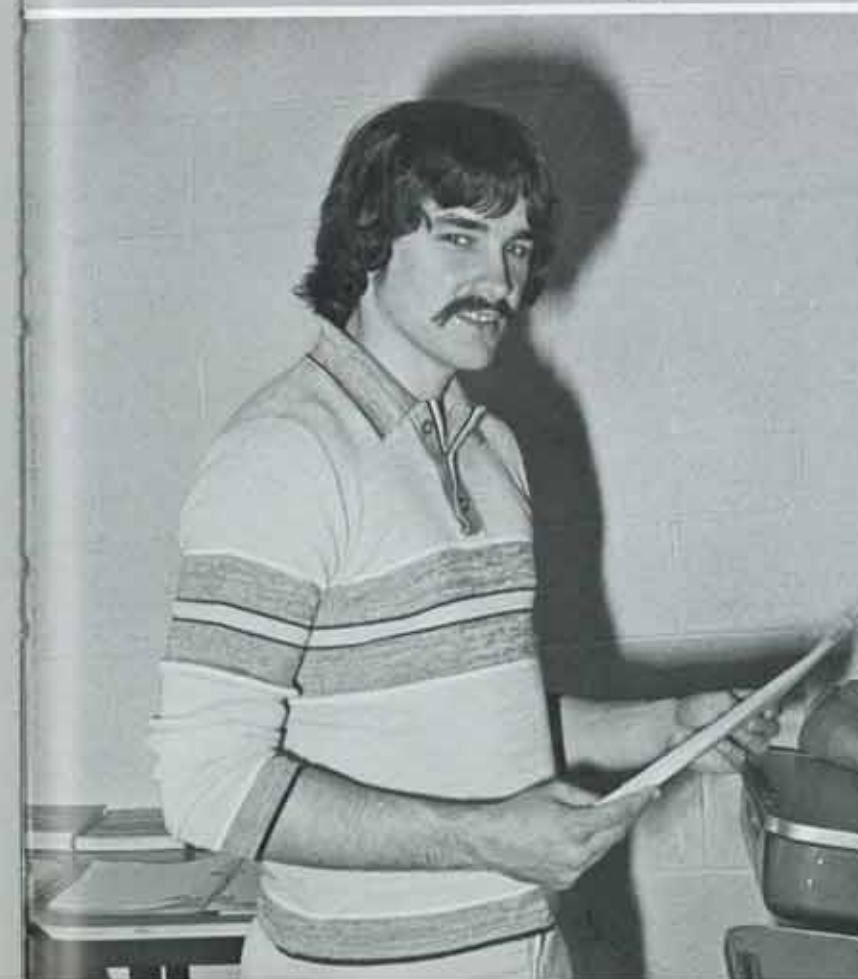
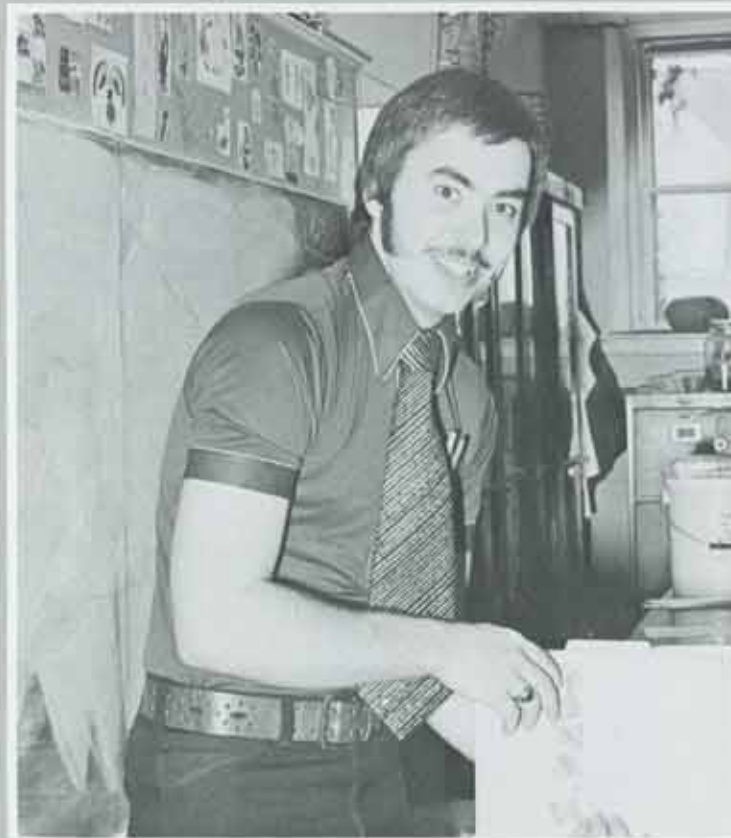
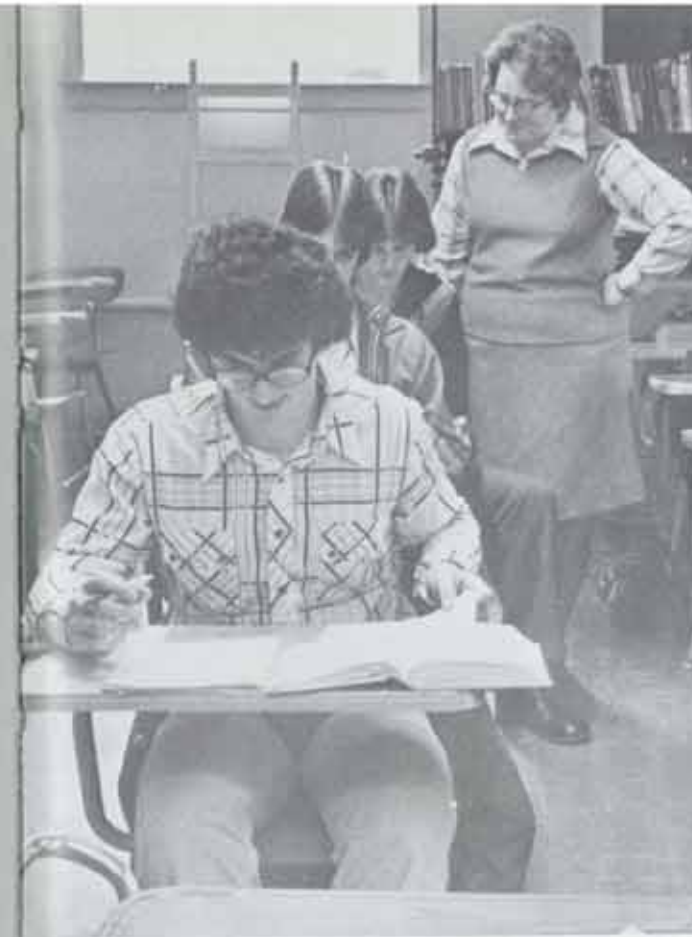
Business, Math, Science Learning By Doing

At Sacred Heart, the areas of Business, Math, and Science are an integral factor for maintaining a school based on excellence.

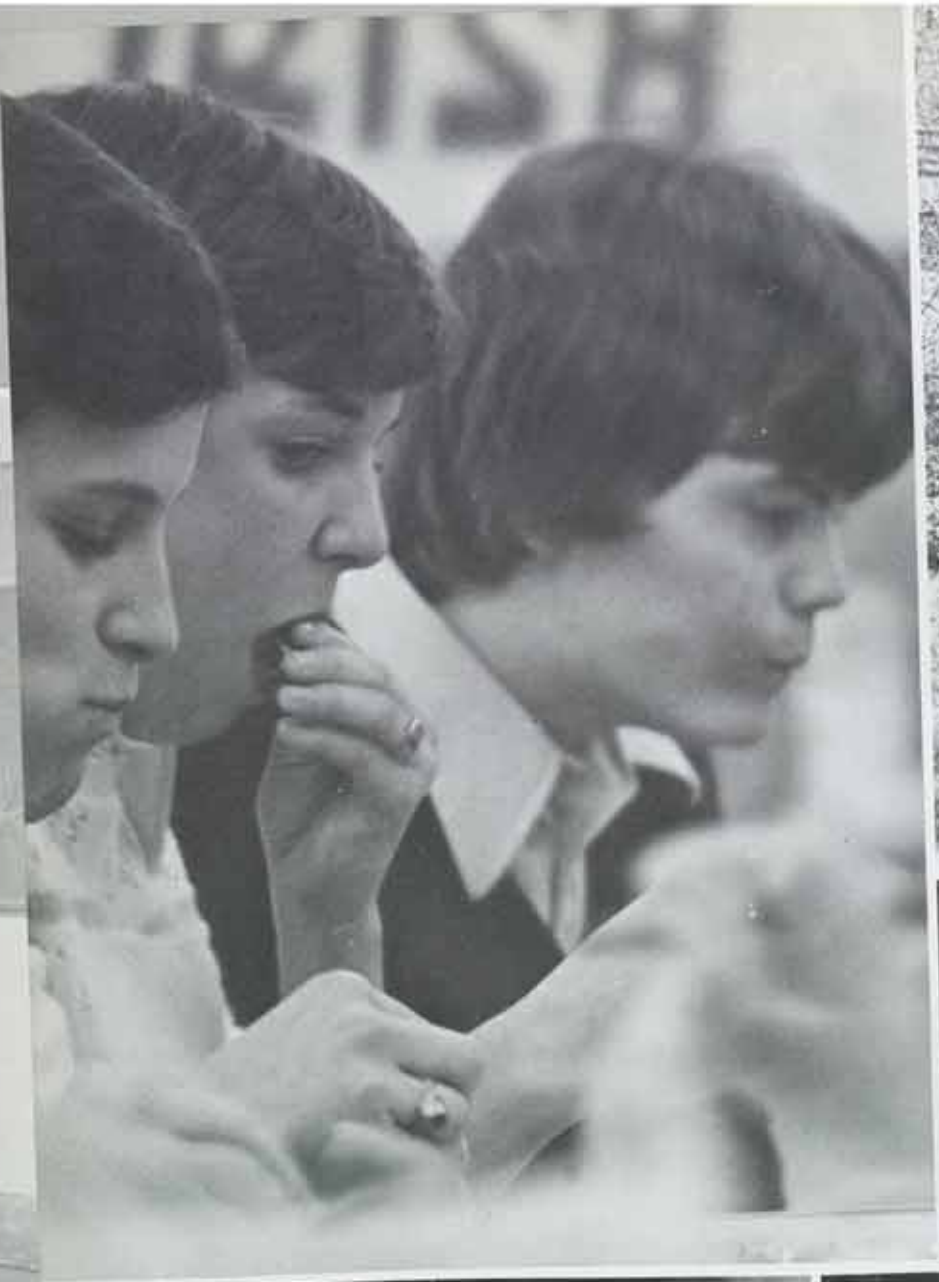
