




Our Fearless Leaders






Sister Euphemia has been at S.H.A. for twelve years. She rought English 12, Shakespeare, and Novels.





We've Got That Faith In Our ...





Physics was taught by Mr. Cooper. Some of the knowledge obtained was vector and scaler quantities, hyperabola and parabola graphs and various forms of matter.










Gym Is Tricky "Business"






Pom Pon Girls "Celebrate"























"The Muppets" On Parade



















Homecoming '81 . . . A Week To Remember



















Girls B-Ball







The Irish players were honored with an awards banquer at the end of the season. Receiving awards were:



























Masses And

The pep rallies and assemblles were a part of many important events that took place during the year. Classes were given the chance to show their pride and spirit in various yelling contests, and skill competitions.









