



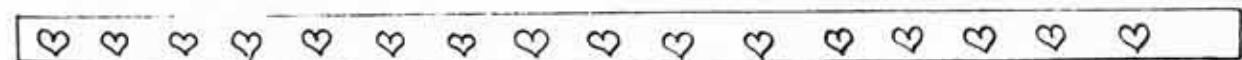

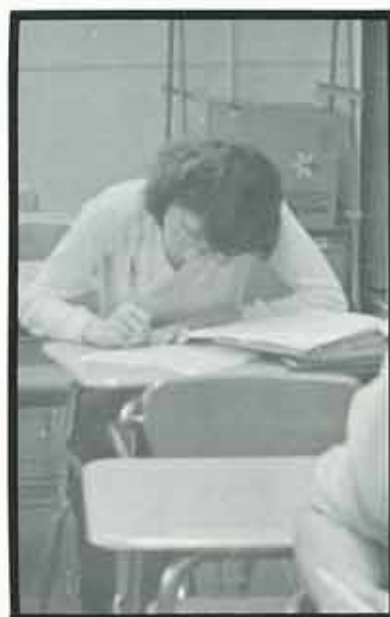
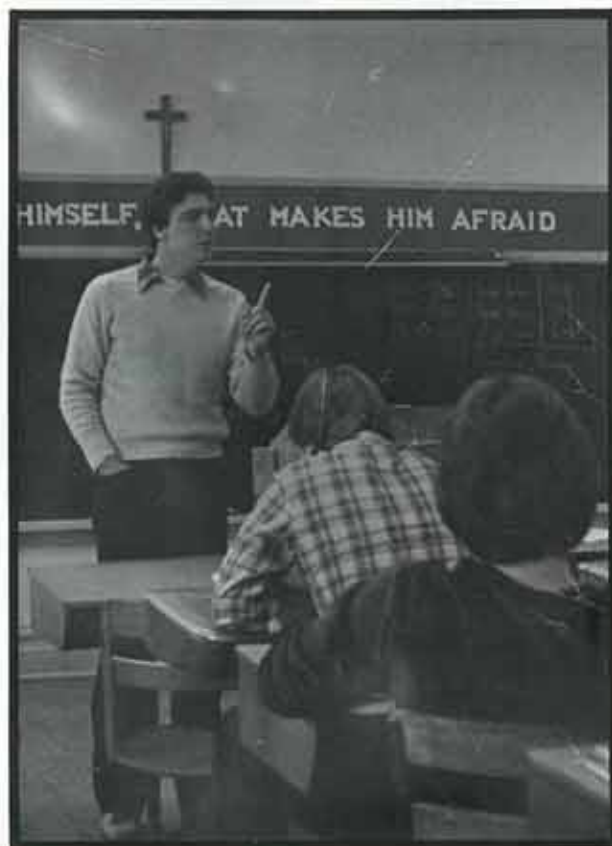

We've Got That Faith In Our . . .

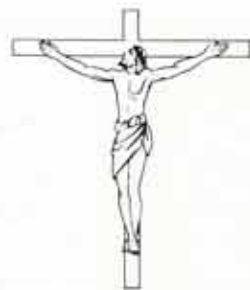

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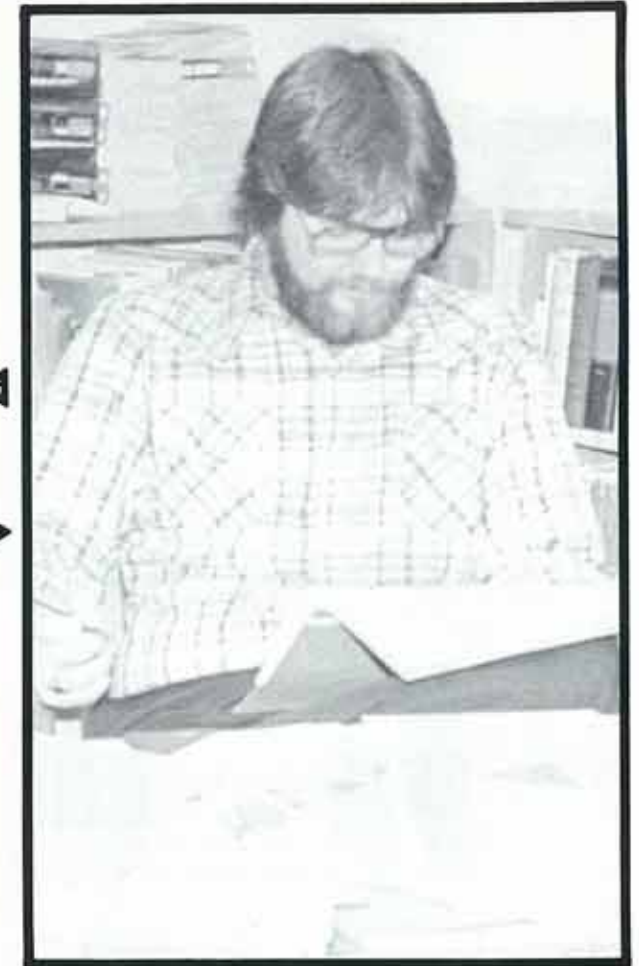
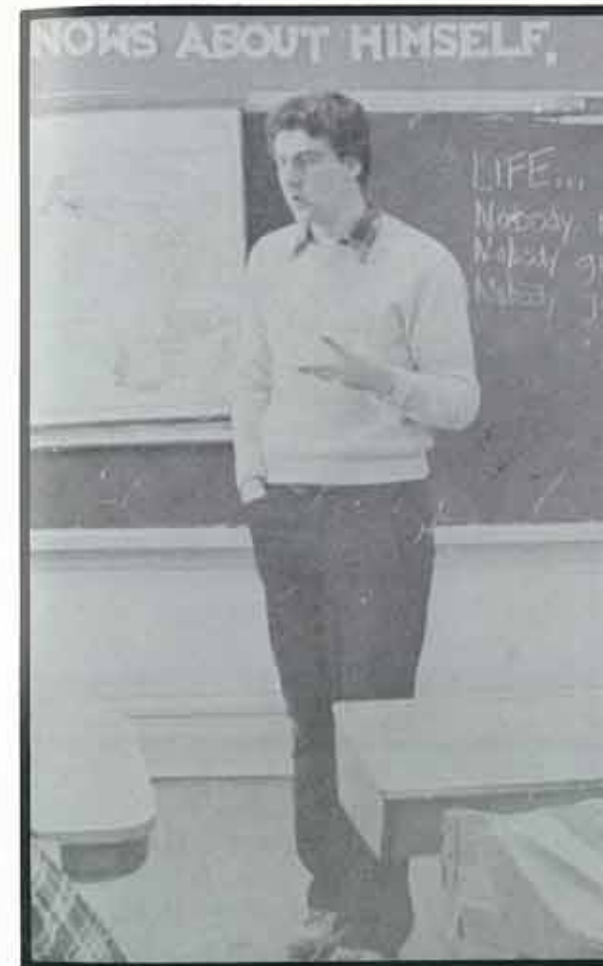
The Social Studies Department

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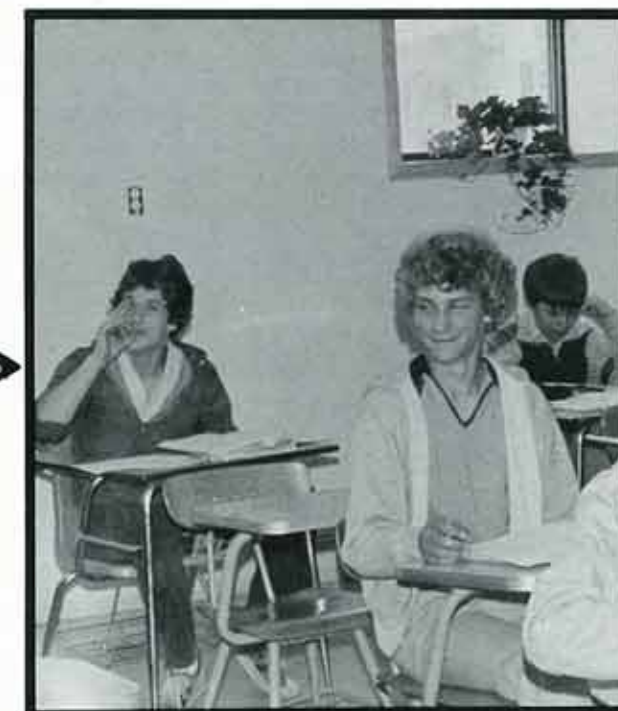
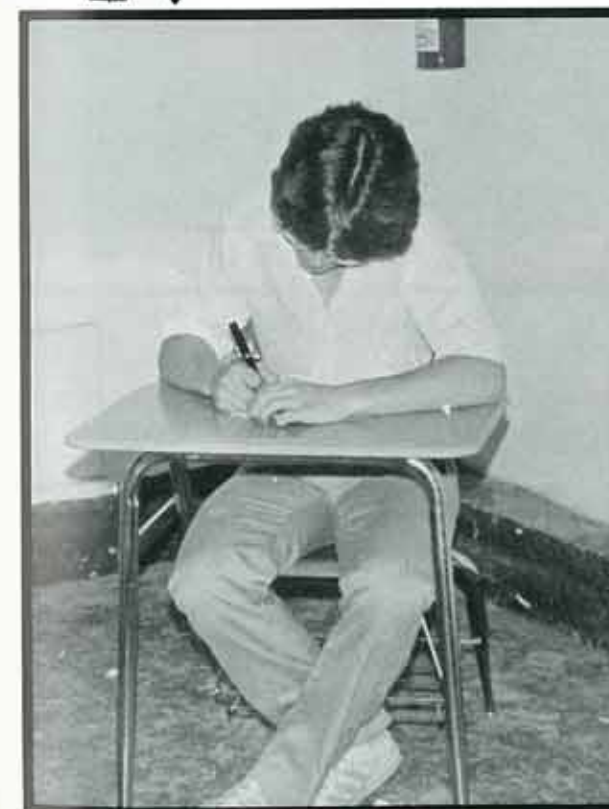

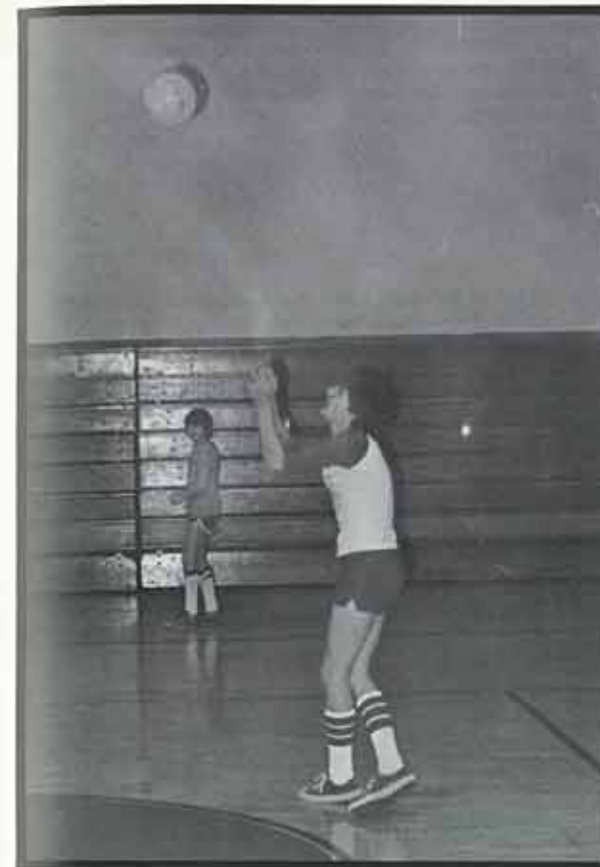


Gym Is Tricky "Business"

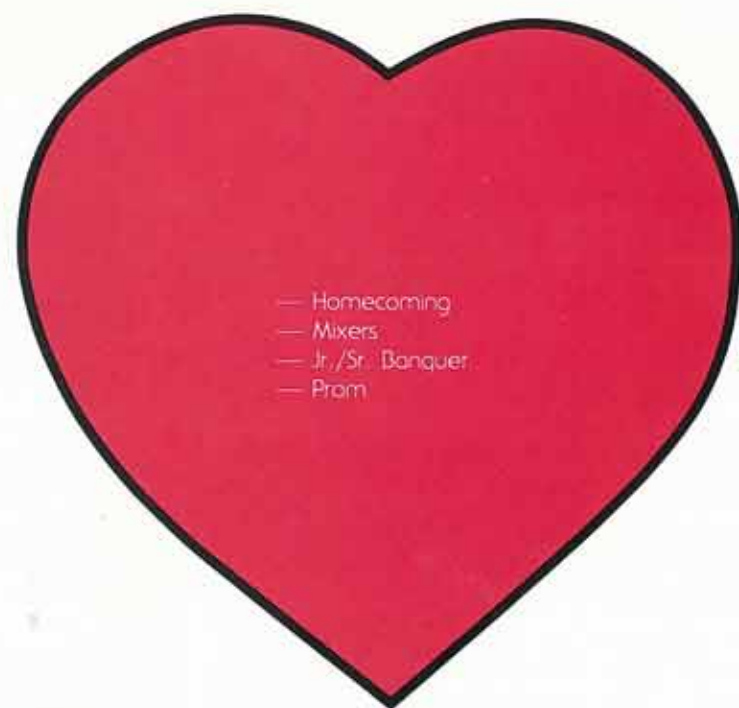

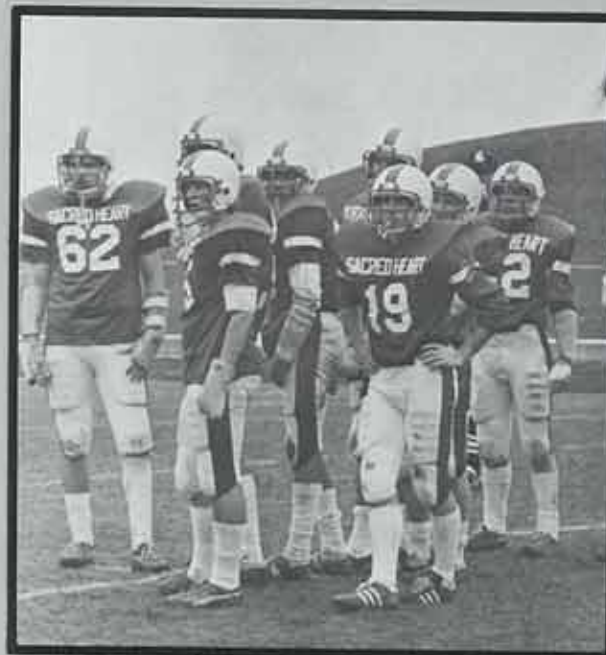
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Homecoming '81 . . . A Week To Remember

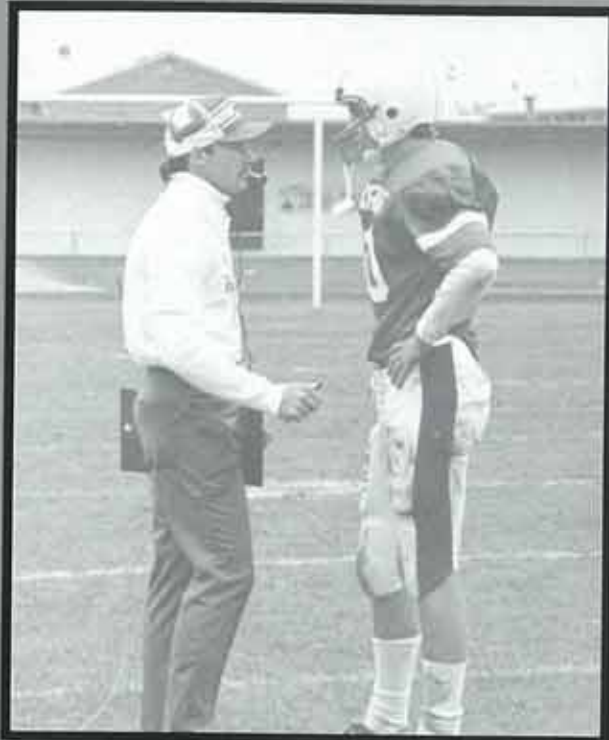

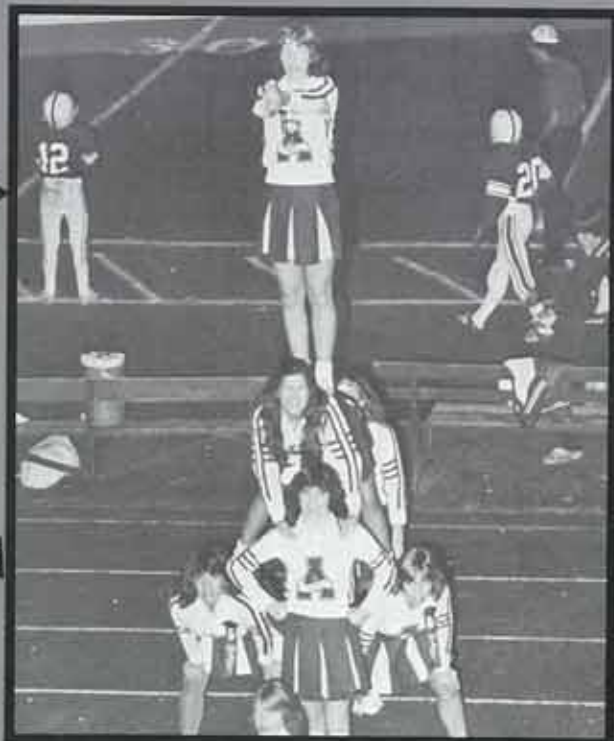

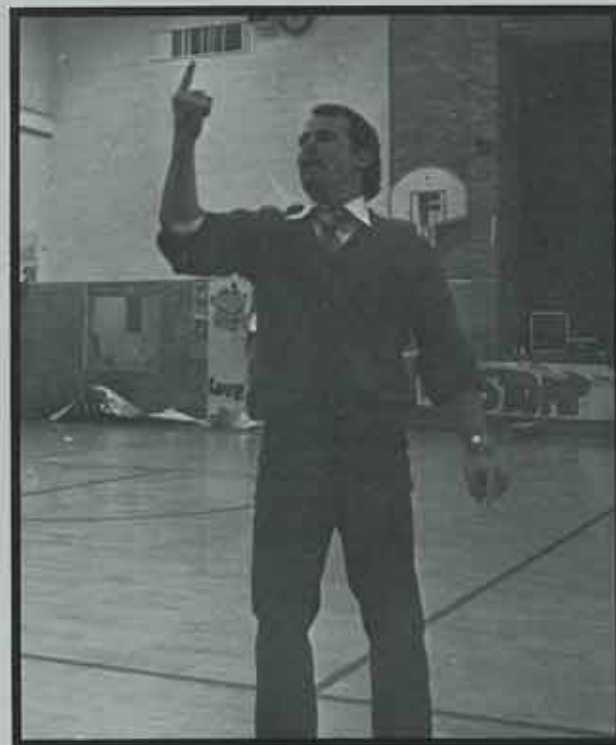


Masses And Assemblies

The pep rallies and assemblies were a part of many important events that took place during the year. Classes were given the chance to show their pride and spirit in various yelling contests, and skill competitions.



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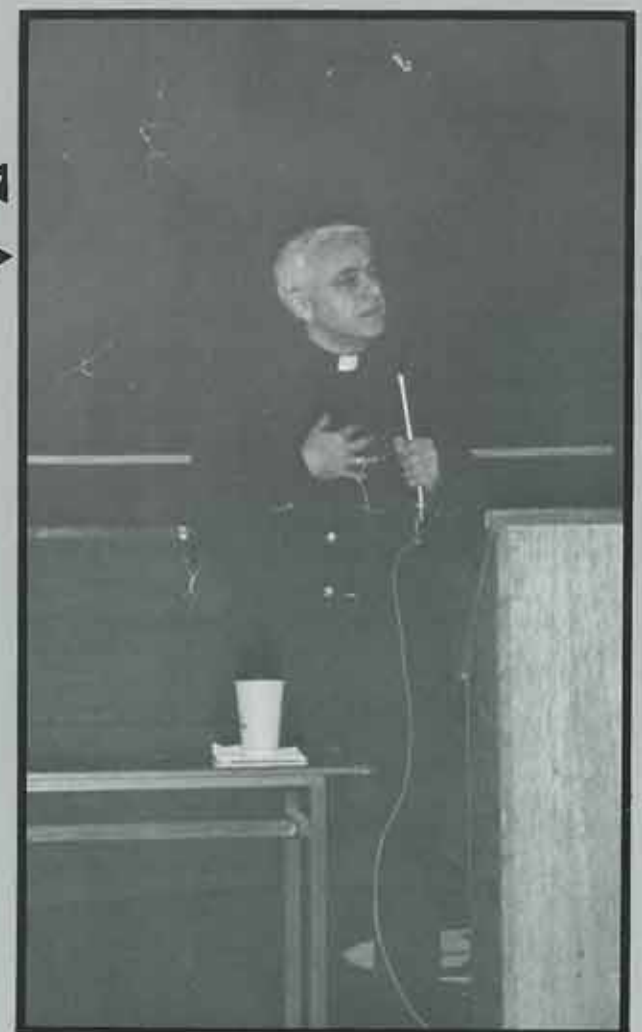

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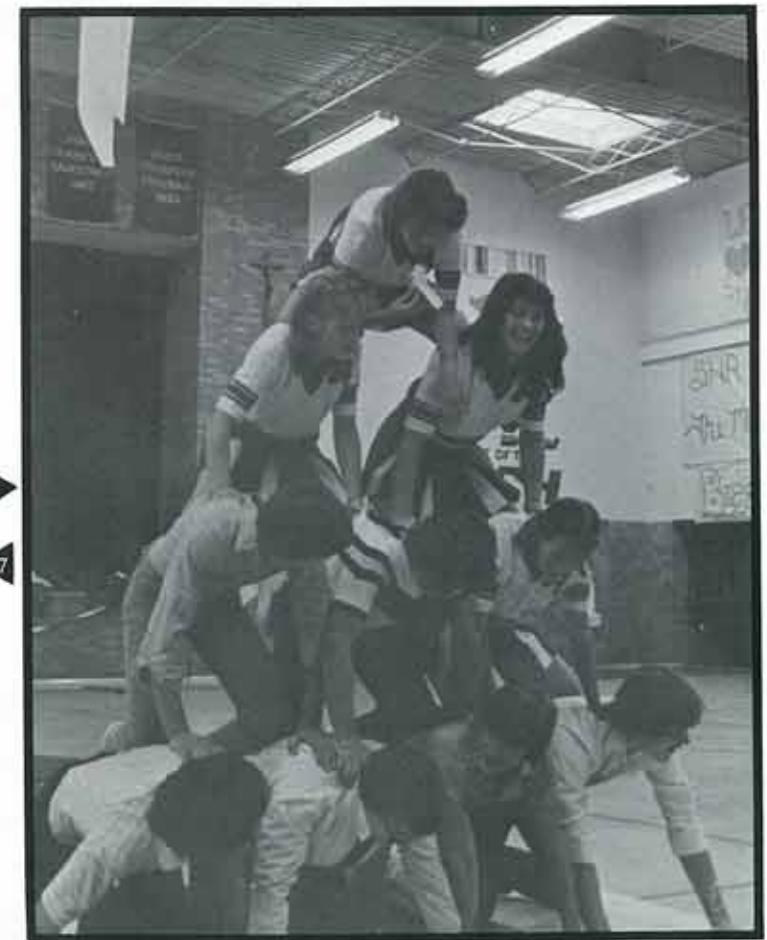
