CAMELOT

King Arthur was the hero of many legends and stories of the Middle Ages. According to most of these, he ruled the Britons in the A.D. 500's. With his wife, the lovely Guenevere, King Arthur lived in a castle called Camelot, a place which has been variously located in Somerset and at Winchester in England, and Wales and Scotland. King Arthur proved his royalty when he was a boy by drawing a magic sword, Excalibur, from a stone in which it had been set.

The knights at his court sat with him at the Round Table. They possessed the qualities of an ideal knight (chivalry): bravery, honor, courtesy, respect for women, protection of the weak, generosity, and magnanimity to enemies. The knights' most famous quest was the search for the Holy Grail, the vessel used by Christ at the Last Supper and given to Joseph of Arimathea.

Arthur brought order and peace to the kingdom while he ruled. Once when he was away on an expedition, his nephew, Mordred, led a group of rebels during his absence. Arthur returned to fight against them and killed Mordred, but was wounded. According to legend, he was carried away secretly to the Isle of Avalon to be healed. He never returned.



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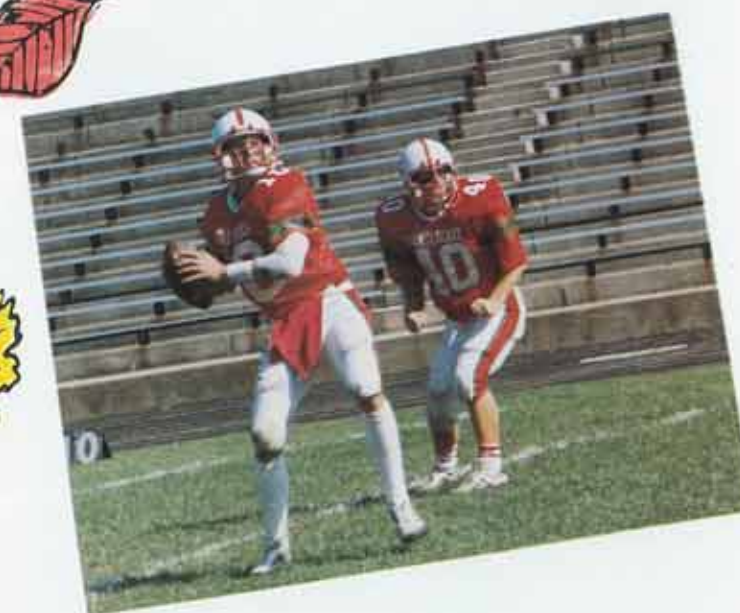
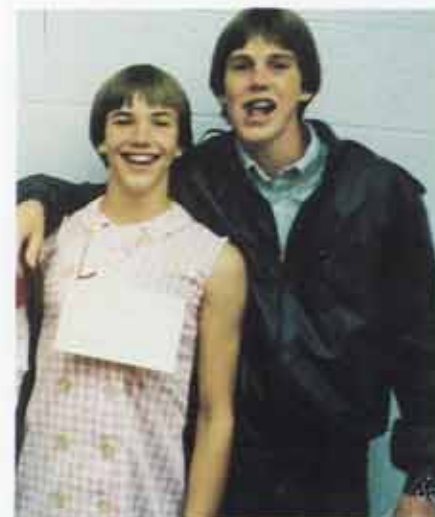

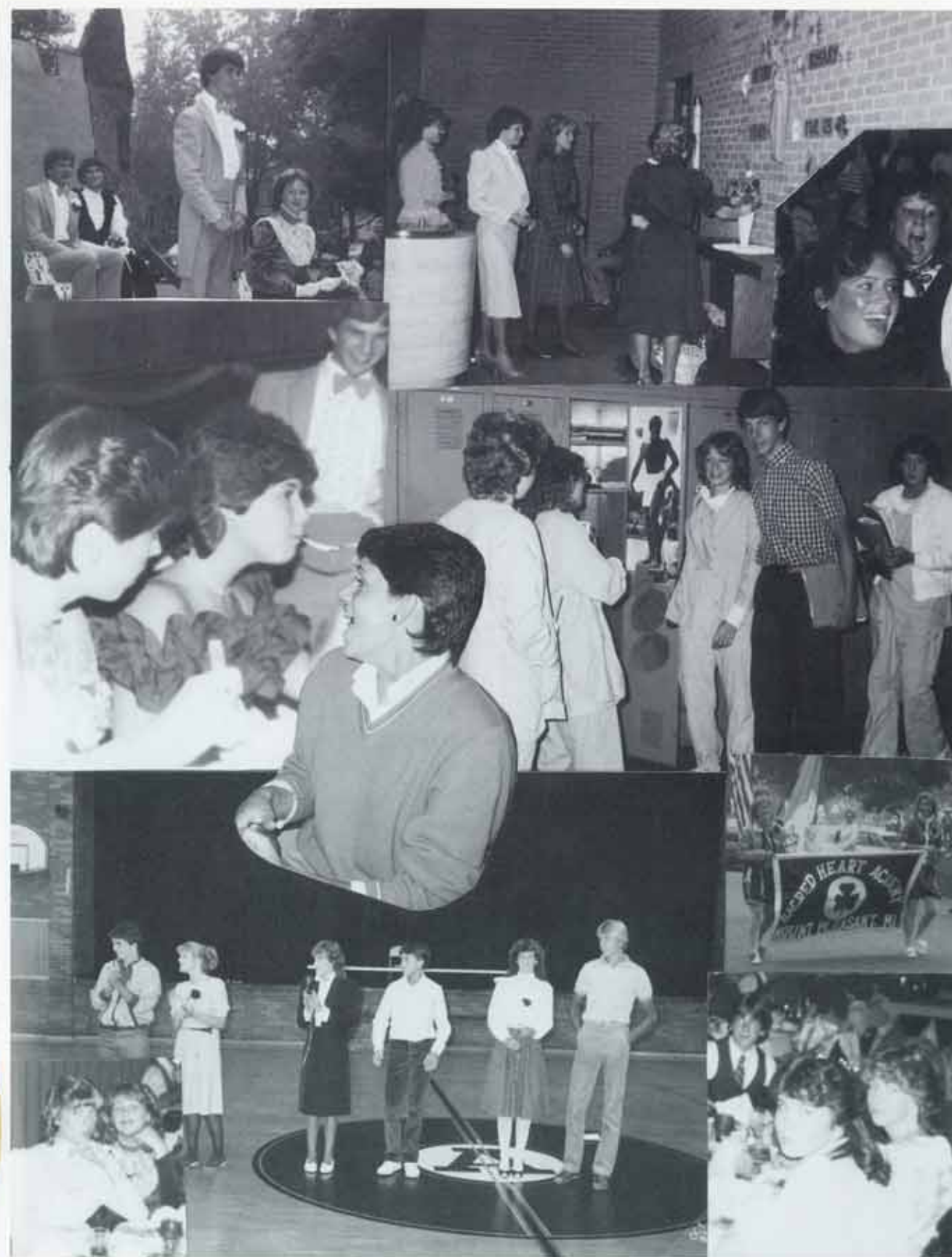

SCIENCE HEALTH PHYSICS

Physics before 8 a.m. can be quite a challenge for both students and the teacher, Sr. Loretta. Vectors, Entropy, light and electricity were topics that were stressed. Sr. Genny taught the second semester due to Sr. Loretta's illness.

Health, Biology and Physiology were taught by Mr. Reid. The five areas covered in Health were spiritual, mental, physical, emotional and social. 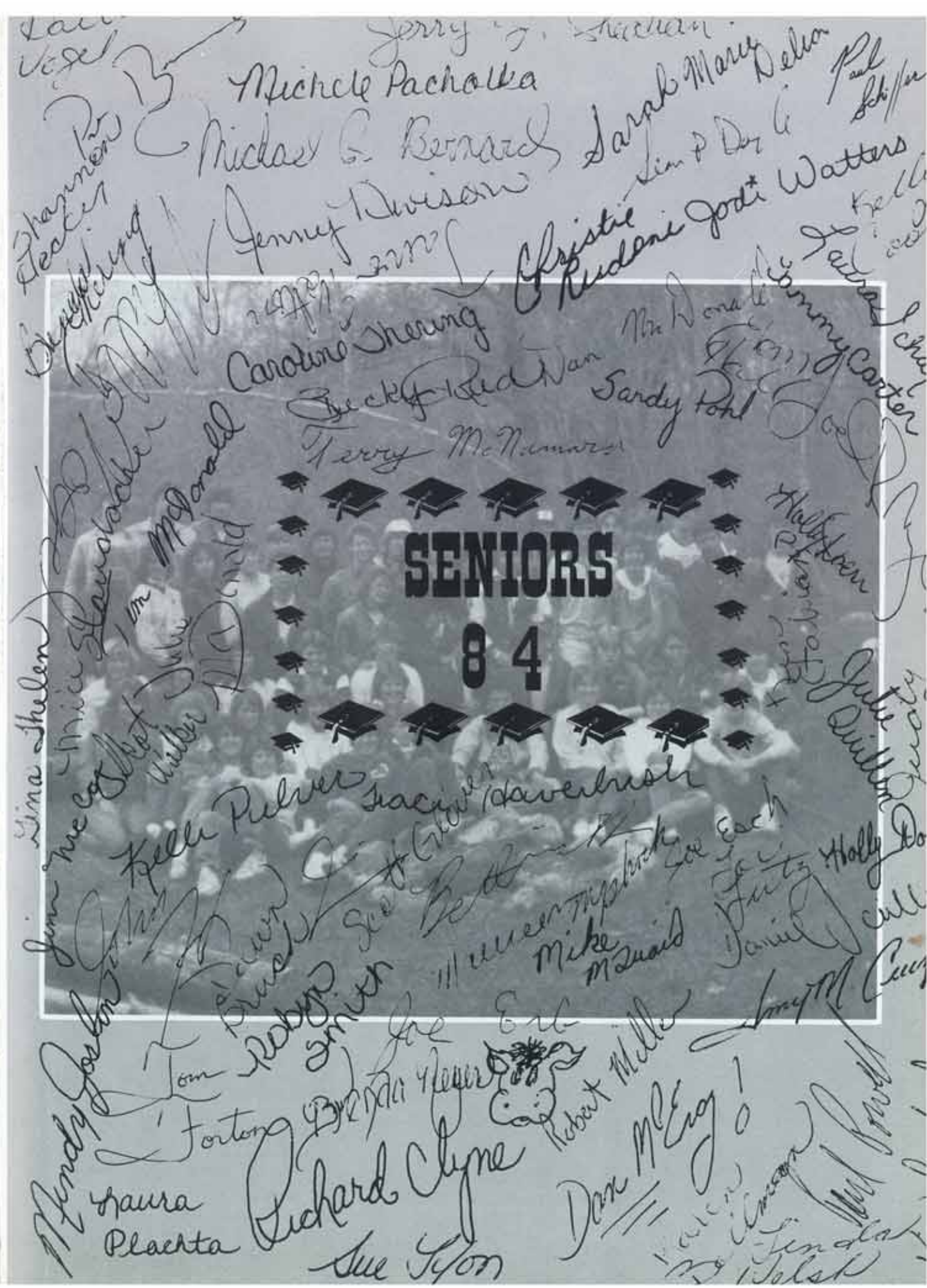




We've had a really good year, with a staff of 18. We sold more ads than ever before. Everyone worked together really well and had a lot of fun putting this book together.
